## INTRODUCTION

The Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) profoundly affected the modern civil rights movement as well as the course of American political history in the second half of the twentieth century. The organization's records provide researchers with a treasure of primary source material on the complexities of organizing a successful mass protest movement. Organizational working papers, internal memoranda, correspondence, minutes of meetings, field reports, press releases, pamphlet publications, questionnaire replies, statistical compilations, and many other types of documents bring to light the struggle for civil rights. Making these records widely available in microform provides students, scholars, and other researchers with the opportunity to experience the inner workings of this pivotal force in the modern civil rights movement.

The SCLC embodied the vision and philosophy of its founding president, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., as well as the hopes, aspirations, and energy of countless community leaders and local activists. It became the collective organizational extension for the hopes, aspirations, and activism of southern communities. Individuals representing varied political, social, religious, and ideological backgrounds found commonality in supporting activities that challenged racism. King's philosophy of nonviolent direct action and his vision for a mass movement based on Christian tenets of love and understanding guided the activities of the SCLC. Although there were precursors to this vision, such as the philosophies of labor leader A. Philip Randolph and the pacifists organized under the Fellowship of Reconciliation, nonviolent direct action only became a major force in American politics for the first time under the leadership of King and the SCLC.

The SCLC leaders had no illusions about either the danger or the difficulty of challenging the tyranny of jim crow in southern life. Fear of reprisals as well justified in light of traditions of lynching, police brutality, and economic discrimination in the South. Instilling the will, strength, and courage to throw off the yoke of subordination and dehumanization under jim crow was an ambitious undertaking. There were divisions within the African American population of the South

and there were apprehensions about the formidable force of southern racism. These were considerable obstacles against the creation of a mass movement. Yet the realities of racist traditions and denigration spurred African American leaders into alliance and action. Their objective was to stimulate activities that would address, challenge, and correct the injustices of jim crow life. The new coalition sought to employ a mechanism that would secure basic civil rights and civil liberties. Many local groups and individuals who were prominent in addressing issues of segregation and discrimination were eager to employ the tactics of nonviolent direct action. The SCLC leadership worked to maintain confidence in nonviolent methods and to rally community after community against often discouraging odds.

Among the disparate groups and individuals who flocked to the SCLC, the success of the ethic of nonviolence gained appeal. King and other SCLC leaders worked tirelessly to maintain confidence in nonviolent methods. The SCLC succeeded again and again with nonviolent direct action and passive resistance campaigns. A seemingly endless cascade of demonstrations, marches, boycotts, and sit-ins confronted the practice of southern racism. Occasionally the demonstrators were beaten back. Occasionally they were met with only token concessions. Cumulatively, however, their campaigns wore down the defense of jim crow and energized the African American community in the South to address the issues of place and access.

It is important to recognize that the movement's success drew upon earlier traditions of African American protest. Foremost, the work of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) laid much of the foundation for the modern civil rights movement. Since early in the century, the NAACP cultivated local civil rights leaders amongst its vast branch network in the South. Its conspicuous involvement in numerous, high-profile civil rights legal cases, leading up to the landmark ruling that demolished the constitutional approval of segregation in America, provided a popular example that African American assertiveness could triumph in American politics. Equally important, the constitutional victory in Brown v. Board of Education required the federal government to side with advocates of desegregation. In theory, at least, this deprived the white South and provided the civil rights movement with a powerful ally.

Reaching even further back in the history of the South was the network of African American women's clubs. The activism and advocacy of Negro women's clubs and organizations was significant in the development of a mass social movement. These women were involved in campaigns for health care, access to decent housing,

preparatory schools, organizing domestic workers, promoting employment, and strongly supporting antilynching legislation. Negro women had historically formed coalitions that relentlessly fought to improve the plight and well-being of their children, pinning many of their hopes and ambitions vicariously on future generations. These women have been at the forefront in the struggle for social, economic, and political justice. The traditions and strengths of feminine activism provide an important source of strength and inspiration for the modern civil rights movement.

The Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters (BSCP) was the largest all—African American labor union in America. Its members passed through and often lived in the urban South. The porters spread the news that the segregation and racial oppression of the South was not a norm to which African Americans must submit. The message was reinforced by the union's leader, A. Philip Randolph. Randolph was the earliest major African American political leader to advocate nonviolent direct action. His threat of an organized mass demonstration in the nation's capital in 1942 compelled President Franklin D. Roosevelt to issue an executive order banning discrimination in defense industries and federal agencies. Randolph's dramatic victory served to inspire civil rights activists while his rank and file among the BSCP quietly subverted acquiescence to the southern way of segregation.

The political left also played a role in energizing the civil rights movement. The Civil Rights Congress—although not southern based took on several high-profile cases involving police brutality and abuses of sharecroppers in the South in the 1940s and 1950s. This organization won many admirers, a number of whom remained active in the civil rights movement in the era of the SCLC. The Highlander Folk School was another source of influence from the political left. Since the 1930s, Highlander tried to forge a progressive interracial coalition of labor unions, tenant farmers, educators, and religious leaders in the South. Its educational workshops were attended by such pillars of the modern civil rights movement as Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King, Jr. While relations with the political left often posed a liability to the SCLC by exposing it to the slander of redbaiters, leftist activists brought both energy and disciplined intellectual commitment to the ranks of the modern civil rights movement.

Beyond self-conscious racial reform movements, there were political and cultural trends in the 1940s and 1950s that fed the development of the SCLC. African American military service during World War II and Korea had an impact. Southern veterans who returned home after serving the cause of freedom were reluctant to acquiesce in inferiority.

The action taken by President Harry S. Truman in ordering the desegregation of the armed services in 1948 provided additional momentum. Thereafter, southern African Americans serving in the military served with the express understanding that racial equality rather than segregation was the official policy of the United States armed services. Many local-level civil rights activists in the 1960s were military veterans.

Popular culture and the mass media also contributed to a spirit of African American pride and assertiveness that made possible an insurgent mass movement in the 1960s. The immense popularity of boxer Joe Louis, baseball star Jackie Robinson, and Olympian Jesse Owens in the 1930s, 1940s, and 1950s did much to enhance the African American self-image. Louis's victories over his white opponents, Robinson's stardom in a virtually all-white league, and Owen's dramatic refutation of Nazi racial pretensions provided indelible images of African American achievements. These were living refutations of the segregationist belief in black inferiority.

Finally, the African American ministry was also poised to take advantage of the developments favoring a more assertive political style in the 1950s. The church had historically been at the forefront in addressing the needs of the community, such as in the establishment of schools and benevolent societies. The church had long been responsible for picking up the pieces left in the wake of racist oppression in the South. The counseling and consoling of violated females, providing emotional and material relief for cheated sharecroppers, eulogizing of innocent victims of white violence—these were almost daily tasks of the African American clergy throughout the South. Clergymen frequently served as ambassadors to the white community in an effort to mediate disputes along the color line. As a result, many churches had for long expanded their activities beyond the traditional religious emphasis on the Sacred. In doing this, they often risked their reputations in the larger community, their resources, and sometimes even their physical security. Many in the black ministry were of necessity shrewd political strategists. They were willing to embrace new political concepts if those concepts bore a fair chance of improving the lot of their people. King's philosophy for nonviolent direct action struck many as an opportune strategy for social advancement and social justice.

## **SCOPE & CONTENT NOTE**

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. served as president of the SCLC from its founding in 1957 until his assassination in April 1968. This edition consists of the President's Office records during Dr. King's tenure as well as a small number of public statements made by him between 1954 and 1957. The President's Office File consists of two series of records: Series I, Correspondence, 1958–1968 and Series II, Manuscripts and Appointment Calendars, 1954–1969. A third series exists in the original collection, consisting of tape recordings of speeches made by Dr. King and other civil rights leaders. These have not been transcribed and hence are not a part of this microfilm edition.

#### Series I. Correspondence, 1958-1968

The correspondence series is divided into three subseries. The first two subseries are called "Primary Correspondence." The first subseries of primary correspondence is arranged chronologically from 1958 through 1968. The second subseries is arranged alphabetically by correspondent. These two series overlap significantly in content. The subject and correspondent indexes to the user guide can assist in cross referencing between subseries 1 and 2. Subseries 3, called "Secondary Correspondence," consists of letters from the general public to Dr. King.

# Series I, Correspondence, Subseries 1, Primary Correspondence [Chronological], 1958–1968

This subseries consists of internal SCLC communications, such as notices of board meetings and conventions, correspondence regarding Dr. King's speaking engagements, and letters from prominent people concerning the civil rights movement. Many of the key events of the civil rights movement are covered, including the integration movement in downtown Atlanta (1962), the Birmingham, Alabama, demonstrations (1963), allegations of Communist affiliations among SCLC staff members (1964), the award of the Nobel Peace Prize to Dr. King (1964), the organization of SCLC's "Operation Dialogue" (1965), the Selma, Alabama, campaign (1965), SCLC's initiatives in Chicago, Illinois (1966), and Dr. King's opposition to the Vietnam war (1966–

1967). This series extends from the beginning of Reel 1 through Reel 2, frame 0491.

# Series I, Correspondence, Subseries 2, Primary Correspondents [alphabetical], 1958–1968

Most of this series consists of correspondence files with individuals, but there are also files on organizations and subjects. Key individuals include Ralph Abernathy, Ella J. Baker, James Dombrowski, Jack Greenberg, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, A. J. Muste, and Roy Wilkins. More correspondents are represented, many of them prominent in the civil rights movement. Organizations with substantive amounts of correspondence include American Jewish Committee, American Negro Leadership Conference on Africa, Episcopal Society for Cultural and Racial Unity, Ford Foundation, and Leadership Conference on Civil Rights. Prominent subject files in the series include Albany, Georgia, Ministers, Atlanta Temple Bombing, Labor Leaders, and News Media Requests.

The Ella Baker letters are illuminating on the day-to-day functions of the SCLC during the years of Baker's tenure as executive director (1958–1960). The file on the Atlanta Temple Bombing includes an open letter from the "Negroes of Montgomery" deploring the anti-Semitic bombing of the Temple of the Hebrew Welfare Congregation of Atlanta. Numerous files document the relationship between the SCLC and other civil rights organizations, including Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (Stokely Carmichael file), Southern Conference Educational Fund (James Dombrowski file), NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund, Inc. (Jack Greenberg file), NAACP (Roy Wilkins file), and Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party (Lawrence Guyot file). This subseries extends from frame 0493 of Reel 2 through frame 0811 of Reel 3.

# Series I, Correspondence, Subseries 3, Secondary Correspondence, 1958, 1960–1967

This series consists of correspondence from the general public to Dr. King and the SCLC. A great deal of it is hate mail, although there are also thousands of supportive letters from clergy, intellectuals, political leaders, and the general public. Some of the supportive letters voice skepticism and criticism about the pace and style of the SCLC direct-action campaign. The hate mail is revealing about racist attitudes toward African Americans in the 1960s, especially but not exclusively in the South. Many of the negative letters reflect the popular mood of anticommunism in the 1960s, as writers accuse King of Communist sympathies. Supporters, on the other hand, often note financial

contributions to the SCLC. The correspondents often respond to specific events in Dr. King's career and in the civil rights movement, including arrests, major demonstrations like those in Birmingham, Alabama, the March on Washington, the Selma March, bombings, murders of civil rights workers, and King's opposition to the Vietnam War. The series is useful in charting popular reaction to King's career as well as in documenting the attitudes, both constructive and negative, that were faced by the civil rights movement on a day-to-day basis. King's responses to many of the letters shed light on his character and political style. This series is arranged chronologically. It begins at frame 0812 of Reel 3 and continues through frame 0627 of Reel 19.

# Series II, Manuscripts and Appointment Calendars, 1954–1969. Subseries 1, Manuscripts, 1954–1969

This series contains many of Dr. King's most important speeches and essays. It includes sermons dating to 1954, statements on major civil rights demonstrations, his reply to FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover's criticism, transcripts of interviews with "Meet the Press" and *Playboy* magazine, newspaper columns written by King for the *Amsterdam News*, and copies of several anti–Vietnam War speeches. Also included are a few of Dr. King's itineraries. The series is arranged chronologically beginning at frame 0628 of Reel 19 through frame 269 of Reel 21.

# Series II, Manuscripts and Appointment Calendars, 1954–1969. Subseries 2, Appointment Calendars, 1959–1965.

This series begins on frame 0270 of Reel 21. It contains incomplete appointment calendars that nonetheless list many of Dr. King's major engagements. The series ends at the conclusion of Reel 21.

### INTRODUCTION

The Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) profoundly affected the modern civil rights movement as well as the course of American political history in the second half of the twentieth century. The organization's records provide researchers with a treasure of primary source material on the complexities of organizing a successful mass protest movement. Organizational working papers, internal memoranda, correspondence, minutes of meetings, field reports, press releases, pamphlet publications, questionnaire replies, statistical compilations, and many other types of documents bring to light the struggle for civil rights. Making these records widely available in microform provides students, scholars, and other researchers with the opportunity to experience the inner workings of this pivotal force in the modern civil rights movement.

The SCLC embodied the vision and philosophy of its founding president, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., as well as the hopes, aspirations, and energy of countless community leaders and local activists. It became the collective organizational extension for the hopes, aspirations, and activism of southern communities. Individuals representing varied political, social, religious, and ideological backgrounds found commonality in supporting activities that challenged racism. King's philosophy of nonviolent direct action and his vision for a mass movement based on Christian tenets of love and understanding guided the activities of the SCLC. Although there were precursors to this vision, such as the philosophies of labor leader A. Philip Randolph and the pacifists organized under the Fellowship of Reconciliation, nonviolent direct action only became a major force in American politics for the first time under the leadership of King and the SCLC.

The SCLC leaders had no illusions about either the danger or the difficulty of challenging the tyranny of jim crow in southern life. Fear of reprisals were well justified in light of traditions of lynching, police brutality, and economic discrimination in the South. Instilling the will, strength, and courage to throw off the yolk of subordination and dehumanization under jim crow was an ambitious undertaking. There were divisions within the African American population of the South

and there were apprehensions about the formidable force of southern racism. These were considerable obstacles against the creation of a mass movement. Yet the realities of racist traditions and denigration spurred African American leaders into alliance and action. Their objective was to stimulate activities that would address, challenge, and correct the injustices of jim crow life. The new coalition sought to employ a mechanism that would secure basic civil rights and civil liberties. Many local groups and individuals who were prominent in addressing issues of segregation and discrimination were eager to employ the tactics of nonviolent direct action. The SCLC leadership worked to maintain confidence in nonviolent methods and to rally community after community against often discouraging odds.

Among the disparate groups and individuals who flocked to the SCLC, the success of the ethic of nonviolence gained appeal. King and other SCLC leaders worked tirelessly to maintain confidence in nonviolent methods. The SCLC succeeded again and again with nonviolent direct action and passive resistance campaigns. A seemingly endless cascade of demonstrations, marches, boycotts, and sit-ins confronted the practice of southern racism. Occasionally the demonstrators were beaten back. Occasionally they were met with only token concessions. Cumulatively, however, their campaigns wore down the defense of jim crow and energized the African American community in the South to address the issues of place and access.

It is important to recognize that the movement's success drew upon earlier traditions of African American protest. Foremost, the work of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) lay much of the foundation for the modern civil rights movement. Since early in the century, the NAACP cultivated local civil rights leaders amongst its vast branch network in the South. Its conspicuous involvement in numerous, high-profile civil rights legal cases, leading up to the landmark ruling that demolished the constitutional approval of segregation in America, provided a popular example that African American assertiveness could triumph in American politics. Equally important, the constitutional victory in Brown v. Board of Education required the federal government to side with advocates of desegregation. In theory, at least, this deprived the white South and provided the civil rights movement with a powerful ally.

Reaching even further back in the history of the South was the network of African American women's clubs. The activism and advocacy of Negro women's clubs and organizations was significant in the development of a mass social movement. These women were involved in campaigns for health care, access to decent housing,

preparatory schools, organizing domestic workers, promoting employment, and strongly supporting antilynching legislation. Negro women had historically formed coalitions that relentlessly fought to improve the plight and well-being of their children, pinning many of their hopes and ambitions vicariously on future generations. These women have been at the forefront in the struggle for social, economic, and political justice. The traditions and strengths of feminine activism provide an important source of strength and inspiration for the modern civil rights movement.

The Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters (BSCP) was the largest all-African American labor union in America. Its members passed through and often lived in the urban South. The porters spread the news that the segregation and racial oppression of the South was not a norm to which African Americans must submit. The message was reinforced by the union's leader, A. Philip Randolph. Randolph was the earliest major African American political leader to advocate nonviolent direct action. His threat of an organized mass demonstration in the nation's capital in 1942 compelled President Franklin D. Roosevelt to issue an executive order banning discrimination in defense industries and federal agencies. Randolph's dramatic victory served to inspire civil rights activists while his rank and file among the BSCP quietly subverted acquiescence to the southern way of segregation.

The political left also played a role in energizing the civil rights movement. The Civil Rights Congress—although not southern based took on several high-profile cases involving police brutality and abuses of sharecroppers in the South in the 1940s and 1950s. This organization won many admirers, a number of whom remained active in the civil rights movement in the era of the SCLC. The Highlander Folk School was another source of influence from the political left. Since the 1930s, Highlander tried to forge a progressive interracial coalition of labor unions, tenant farmers, educators, and religious leaders in the South. Its educational workshops were attended by such pillars of the modern civil rights movement as Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King, Jr. While relations with the political left often posed a liability to the SCLC by exposing it to the slander of redbaiters, leftist activists brought both energy and disciplined intellectual commitment to the ranks of the modern civil rights movement.

Beyond self-conscious racial reform movements, there were political and cultural trends in the 1940s and 1950s that fed the development of the SCLC. African American military service during World War II and Korea had an impact. Southern veterans who returned home after serving the cause of freedom were reluctant to acquiesce in inferiority.

The action taken by President Harry S. Truman in ordering the desegregation of the armed services in 1948 provided additional momentum. Thereafter, southern African Americans serving in the military served with the express understanding that racial equality rather than segregation was the official policy of the United States armed services. Many local-level civil rights activists in the 1960s were military veterans.

Popular culture and the mass media also contributed to a spirit of African American pride and assertiveness that made possible an insurgent mass movement in the 1960s. The immense popularity of boxer Joe Louis, baseball star Jackie Robinson, and Olympian Jesse Owens in the 1930s, 1940s, and 1950s did much to enhance the African American self-image. Louis's victories over his white opponents, Robinson's stardom in a virtually all-white league, and Owen's dramatic refutation of Nazi racial pretensions provided indelible images of African American achievements. These were living refutations of the segregationist belief in black inferiority.

Finally, the African American ministry was also poised to take advantage of the developments favoring a more assertive political style in the 1950s. The church had historically been at the forefront in addressing the needs of the community, such as in the establishment of schools and benevolent societies. The church had long been responsible for picking up the pieces left in the wake of racist oppression in the South. The counseling and consoling of violated females, providing emotional and material relief for cheated sharecroppers, eulogizing of innocent victims of white violence—these were almost daily tasks of the African American clergy throughout the South. Clergymen frequently served as ambassadors to the white community in an effort to mediate disputes along the color line. As a result, many churches had for long expanded their activities beyond the traditional religious emphasis on the Sacred. In doing this, they often risked their reputations in the larger community, their resources, and sometimes even their physical security. Many in the black ministry were of necessity shrewd political strategists. They were willing to embrace new political concepts if those concepts bore a fair chance of improving the lot of their people. King's philosophy for nonviolent direct action struck many as an opportune strategy for social advancement and social justice.

# **SCOPE & CONTENT NOTE**

Between 1957 and 1970 the SCLC had five executive directors. The records of four of these are preserved in the SCLC collection: John L. Tilley (1957–1959), Ella J. Baker (1958–1960), Wyatt T. Walker (1960–1964), and Andrew J. Young (1965–1967). The records of the fifth SCLC director, William A. Rutherford, are not included in the collection.

Each of the executive director's papers is given a separate file series denoted by Roman numerals I through IV in Subgroup II of this microfilm collection. Series V contains records of the SCLC Department of Affiliates, which maintained relationships with religious, civic, and civil rights groups throughout the South under several of the directors.

## Subgroup II, Series I. Records of Dr. John L. Tilley, 1957-1959

John L. Tilley, a minister from Baltimore, Maryland, was made the first permanent director of the SCLC in 1957. The records of his administration are sparse but include two series of correspondence files (one arranged by chronology, and one by correspondent) and a subject file. The first correspondence file (Chronological) includes notices of board meetings, correspondence regarding voting regulations in southern states, and letters on the SCLC voter registration efforts. The second correspondence file (Alphabetical) contains two folders, Carl and Anne Braden and James Dombrowski; all correspondence is with the Southern Conference Education Fund (SCEF). This correspondence concerns cooperation between SCEF and the SCLC. The subject file in the Tilley records includes a copy of the SCLC constitution and bylaws (1957); minutes and agendas of meetings of the executive committee (1957–1959); and three of the original SCLC working papers (1957) on bus boycotts, mass direct action tactics, and the maintenance of disciplined nonviolence in the face of violent reactions to direct action.

## Subgroup II, Series II. Records of Ella J. Baker, 1958–1960

Ella J. Baker was a veteran civil rights organizer based in Harlem. During the 1940s, she served as the national field secretary of the NAACP and developed extensive contacts with civil rights leaders

throughout the country, especially in the South. Prior to her elevation to executive director in July of 1959, she served as associate director, beginning in December 1958. She left the SCLC in 1960 and was instrumental in establishing the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC). Baker's records are divided between a chronological correspondence file, an alphabetical correspondence file, and a subject file. The Chronological Correspondence File includes correspondence with the Ministerial Improvement Association of Hattiesburg, Mississippi; the promotion and sale of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s book, Stride Toward Freedom; SCLC voter registration campaigns; and routine office correspondence. Highlights among the Alphabetical Correspondence File are files concerning SCEF leaders Anne and Carl Braden and James Dombrowski; a file on Clarksdale, Mississippi, leader Aaron Henry; and a file on a 1960 SCLC workshop on nonviolent direct-action tactics. In addition, there are files concerning numerous local activists on voter registration work. The Subject File contains a field report on SCLC work in Louisiana in 1960, minutes and agendas of administrative committee meetings, and sales reports on Stride Toward Freedom.

# Subgroup II, Series III. Records of Wyatt T. Walker, 1952, 1960–1964

Wyatt T. Walker joined the SCLC staff in August 1960, leaving behind his pastorate of the Gillfield Baptist Church in Petersburg, Virginia. Walker had developed a record as a force in the Virginia civil rights movement. He served as a branch president for the NAACP in Petersburg and state director of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE). He also headed the Petersburg Improvement Association, which conducted sit-ins in protest of segregation at the Petersburg public library, and he successfully sued to end the segregation in Federal Court.

During his tenure as executive director for SCLC, Walker was active in organizing the Freedom Rides of 1960 and 1961. He served on the Carl Braden Clemency Appeal Committee in 1961 and 1962 and is credited with laying the groundwork for the Birmingham, Alabama, demonstrations in 1963. He left the SCLC in July 1964 to accept the vice-presidency of Educational Heritage, Inc., a publishing firm in Yonkers, New York. He remained active in the civil rights movement and served on the SCLC board of directors.

Walker's records consist of two subseries of correspondence and an alphabetical subject file. The first correspondence subseries is arranged chronologically, and the second is arranged alphabetically. The Chronological Correspondence File covers donations to the SCLC,

speaking engagements, requests for information about the SCLC, and other routine matters. However, there are also exchanges regarding desegregation of Atlanta restaurants, abolition of the House Un-American Activities Committee, and a meeting with Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy about voting irregularities in the South. There is also correspondence about alleged prejudice in a U.S. Army courtmartial in June 1962, Wyatt Walker's arrest in Shreveport, Louisiana (1962), and civil rights demonstrations in various southern cities. The Alphabetical Correspondence File contains a large subseries on the Albany, Georgia, demonstrations in 1961 and 1962. It also includes files on employment discrimination at major corporations such as Atlantic Steel Company, Hunt Foods, and National Dairies-Kraft Foods. The Braden Files (Carl and Anne) cover Walker's role in the attempt to free the SCEF leader, Carl Braden, who was jailed for contempt of the House Un-American Activities Committee. Several files on the Freedom Ride Coordinating Committee cover Walker's role in setting up the Freedom Rides. They also cover subsequent litigation over the rides. Further information on litigation involving the SCLC can be found in the SCLC attorney Clarence Jones files, the William Kunstler file, the Shreveport, Louisiana, file, and the Sit-ins file. Files on the Institute for Nonviolence document the SCLC's program to encourage nonviolent direct-action tactics. Files on William Kunster discuss a wide range of civil rights cases with which he became involved. Aside from SCLC-related cases, there is information on the case of a SNCC leader, Robert Moses v. Robert F. Kennedy and J. Edgar Hoover, and on a major case in Monroe, North Carolina. There are files on the SCEF, the SNCC, and the SCLC Board of Directors.

The Subject File is smaller than the correspondence files described above. It contains a number of speeches and sermons by Walker, as well as several files of SCLC organizational documents, including a 1963 March on Washington organizing manual. One of the speeches, "The American Dilemma in Miniature," provides a good analysis of the demonstrations in Albany, Georgia, in 1962.

Subgroup II, Series IV. Records of Andrew J. Young, 1960–1970
After serving as SCLC program director from 1961 through 1964,
the Reverend Andrew Young became executive director of the SCLC
during the early part of 1965, succeeding Wyatt T. Walker. As the
organization grew and more demands were placed on the president's
time, the executive director assumed more and more responsibility for
interpretation of the organization's policy and was frequently asked to
stand in for Dr. King at meetings and conferences. As a result,
Young's correspondence and administrative files contain documents

intended for the president but which were ultimately discharged by Young. As executive director, Young also continued in his role as intermediary between the SCLC and the major religious organizations, such as the World Council of Churches and the United Church of Christ. During the Selma and Chicago campaigns, he was frequently called upon as a moderate voice to negotiate in crisis situations. In 1967, Young assumed the executive vice-presidency of the SCLC. The few records from this period are also included in Series IV.

Young's office records are far more voluminous than those for any of the previous executive directors. The records are organized the same as with previous directors, including a chronological correspondence file, an alphabetical correspondence file, and a subject file (called the Administrative File). The correspondence files are so large that only a brief summation can be given here. Researchers are encouraged to survey Reels 4 through 10 and consult the subject index for aid in locating specific topics.

The chronological correspondence subseries, which begins at frame 0853 of Reel 4, indicates the extent of Young's role in the SCLC and as a spokesman for the larger civil rights movement. The bulk of this correspondence concerns Young's numerous speaking engagements. Also included, however, are the following: a plan for publicizing the settlement of the Cripto Company Boycott (January 1965), a memo regarding the organization of the James Reeb Memorial Fund (June 1965), correspondence about a gift of automobiles to the SCLC (December 1965), correspondence regarding the SCLC/SNCC march in protest of the refusal of the Georgia State Legislature to seat Julian Bond (January 1966), a draft letter prepared by attorney Stanley Levison regarding the SCLC position on the Vietnam War (March 1966), and a memorandum on urban rioting (June 1967).

The equally large alphabetical correspondence subseries begins on frame 0429 of Reel 7 and includes mailings to board members of the A. Philip Randolph Institute, as well as minutes of meetings (1965–1969); correspondence with the American Friends Service Committee regarding the Nobel Peace Prize and the anti–Vietnam War movement; correspondence on the American Jewish Committee's trip to Israel (1966); records of the Delta Ministry of Mississippi, including correspondence, reports, and minutes of meetings; correspondence between Fred D. Gray and the mayor of Montgomery, Alabama, regarding the Selma-Montgomery March (1965); documentation on the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party (1965); regular correspondence with the National Council of Churches of Christ (1966–1969); a report on a trip to Africa by John Lewis and Donald Harris (1964); a memorandum about a meeting of SCLC and SNCC staffs in Alabama

(1966); and a lawsuit in which the United Council of Churches of Christ attempted to block the Federal Communications Commission from licensing a television station (1966–1967).

The Administrative (subject) file begins of frame 0927 of Reel 10. This subseries consists of records relating to various SCLC projects, SCLC administration, and to organizations that were affiliated with the SCLC. Included are minutes, correspondence, and ephemera about the American Foundation of Nonviolence (1965–1968); filed reports, correspondence, and neighborhood surveys about the Chicago Project (1960–1967); correspondence, memoranda, and proposals about the Ford Foundation–sponsored Ministers Leadership Training Program (1966–1969); financial reports and correspondence about the SCLC Foundation (1967–1969); minutes of staff meetings and retreats; and numerous speeches, articles, and sermons written by Young.

# Subgroup II, Series V. Records of the Department of Affiliates, 1961–1968

The Department of Affiliates was organized in 1960 to link local community and religious groups to the SCLC. Each affiliate paid nominal dues to the organization and in exchange received financial and staff assistance for locally sponsored voter registration and direct action campaigns. Unfortunately few records of this department survive. Most of the documents in this series are ephemeral in nature, consisting of form letters, leaflets for local rallies, and various sample membership forms. The series is divided into two parts, Alphabetical File, 1961–1968, (containing form letters, lists of affiliates, and a few items about the Ministers Leadership Training Program) and a State File (containing printed material, programs from benefits and rallies, and applications for affiliation).

# Subgroup III, Series I. Records of the Treasurer and Records of the Comptroller and Office Manager

The records of the subgroup Records of Treasurer and of the Comptroller and Office Manager are part of a larger series of Financial Records. There are three subseries in the SCLC Financial Records: Series I, Records of the Treasurer; Series II, Records of the Comptroller and Office Manager; and Series III, Financial Statements. The first two of these are microfilmed in their entirety for this edition. The SCLC Finance Office was responsible for preparing receipts for contributions, supervising the payroll, and for administering personnel policies within the organization. Most of these financial records are in the form of individual contributions, cancelled checks, and payroll records, and these have not been microfilmed for this

publication because of their massive volume. The letters accompanying contributions sometimes reflect the emotions that the SCLC fund-raising campaigns elicited. These records are available for research at the Library and Archives of the King Center.

The activities of the treasurer were not confined to the financial affairs of the SCLC. Reverend Ralph David Abernathy—the only treasurer represented in the collection—also played an active role in the direct action campaigns of the SCLC, especially as an aide and frequent jailmate of Dr. King. Abernathy served as treasurer of the SCLC from its founding in 1957 until his ascension to the presidency in 1968. His files include incoming and outgoing correspondence relating to SCLC activities, to his many speaking engagements, and to his duties as pastor of the West Hunter Street Baptist Church. They also contain perhaps the most complete set of internal SCLC memoranda in the entire record group. In addition, there is an excellent record of monthly, quarterly, and yearly financial reports and budgets, as well as copies of Abernathy's speeches, sermons, and publications. A small number of items created after Abernathy's transition to the presidency of SCLC in 1968 are included in this series. Abernathy's files are divided into six subseries: (1)Correspondence; (2)Memoranda; (3)Financial Reports and Budgets; (4) Publications, Speeches, and Sermons; (5) Itineraries; and (6)Lawsuits.

Abernathy's Correspondence File primarily concerns contributions to the SCLC, fund-raising activities, and his numerous speaking engagements. There are, however, references to several key episodes in the history of the SCLC and the modern civil rights movement that can be gleaned from the "major topics" listings for each file in the reel index of the user guide. Principal correspondents are Martin Luther King, Jr., SCLC executive directors Ella J. Baker and John Tilley, SCLC Public Relations Director James R. Wood, and Clarence Jones, the general counsel for the Gandhi Society. The correspondence is arranged chronologically.

The Memoranda subseries contains the most complete set of internal SCLC memoranda to be found in the record group. These include interoffice communications between Abernathy and the Finance Office staff as well as memoranda sent and received by other SCLC departments. These provide a great deal of information about the administration of the SCLC between 1963 and 1967.

The Financial Reports and Budgets subseries covers 1959 through 1968. Financial reports became increasingly complex as the organization grew. At first, they were made twice yearly, then quarterly, monthly, and finally, by 1966, they were prepared weekly.

The reports include formal statements of income and disbursements as well as miscellaneous reports. Also included are expense breakdowns for the New York and Alabama offices. The reports are arranged in chronological order by fiscal year (September 1–August 31), with the financial reports filed first, followed by auditor's reports and budgets.

Publications, speeches, and sermons cover the years 1958–1967. Most were written by Abernathy. They are arranged chronologically with the title indicated where known. There are a small number of biographical sketches, press releases concerning Abernathy, and programs from various events. Publications written by persons other than Abernathy are filed at the end of the subseries.

The Itineraries subseries includes itineraries for Abernathy, Martin Luther King, Jr., and other SCLC staff members from 1962 to 1966. Lawsuits subseries includes a small amount of correspondence as well as partial legal documents of two cases that challenged Alabama segregation laws, Abernathy v. Patterson and Sullivan v. Abernathy.

The Records of the Comptroller and Office Manager are divided into four subseries: (1) Correspondence; (2) Memoranda; (3) Financial Reports; and (4) Administrative Records. During the formative years of the SCLC, Dr. King's staff in Montgomery handled most of the organization's correspondence and kept financial records. However, as the organization grew, greater demands were placed on the office of the treasurer to provide accurate and sophisticated bookkeeping. Ella Baker and John Tilley, the first two executive directors, and Ralph Abernathy maintained records until an office manager was hired in 1961. The correspondence of Abernathy and the memoranda of Baker and Tilley reveal a great deal about the early period. Between 1961 and 1964, Mrs. Lillie Hunter maintained correspondence, memoranda, and financial report files. Most of the correspondence deals with contributions and contains little of substance. In 1964, a full-time accountant, James Harrison, was hired. By this time, the annual SCLC budget approached one million dollars, and the financial records were subject to close scrutiny by foundations sponsoring SCLC grants and by the Internal Revenue Service. Thus, financial reports became more complex and were prepared more frequently.

# **EDITORIAL NOTE**

The Records of the Executive Director have been microfilmed in their entirety. The Treasurer's files have been extracted from a large body of financial records. Left unfilmed, but available to researchers at the King Center in Atlanta, is a large body of daily financial records for the SCLC, including receipts, invoices, requisitions, and banking records. In addition, researchers should be aware of the companion series of Records of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, 1954–1970. These are Part 1, Records of the President's Office; Part 3, Records of the Public Relations Department; and Part 4, Records of the Program Department.

# INTRODUCTION

The Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) profoundly affected the modern civil rights movement as well as the course of American political history in the second half of the twentieth century. The organization's records provide researchers with a treasure of primary source material on the complexities of organizing a successful mass protest movement. Organizational working papers, internal memoranda, correspondence, minutes of meetings, field reports, press releases and pamphlet publications, questionnaire replies and statistical compilations, and many other types of documents bring to light the struggle for civil rights. Making these records widely available in microform provides students, scholars, or any curious researcher with the opportunity to experience the inner workings of this pivotal force in the modern civil rights movement.

The SCLC embodied the vision and philosophy of its founding president, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., as well as the hopes, aspirations, and energy of countless community leaders and local activists throughout the United States. King's philosophy of nonviolent direct action and his vision for a mass movement based upon the Christian tenets of love and understanding guided the activities of the SCLC. Although there were precursors to this vision, such as the philosophies of labor leader A. Philip Randolph and of the pacifists organized under the Fellowship of Reconciliation, nonviolent direct action became a major force in American politics for the first time under the leadership of King and the SCLC.

The SCLC leaders had no illusions about either the danger or the difficulty of challenging the tyranny of jim crow in southern life. Fear of reprisals were well justified in light of traditions of lynching, police brutality, and economic discrimination in the South. Instilling the will, strength, and courage to throw off a lifetime of subordination and dehumanization under jim crow was an ambitious undertaking. There were divisions within the African American population of the South and there were apprehensions about the formidable force of southern racism. These were considerable obstacles to the creation of a mass movement. Yet the realization of their race's desperate situation, its constant

denigration and psychological burden in southern society spurred African American leaders to action.

Among the disparate groups and individuals who flocked to the SCLC, the ethic of nonviolence gained wide appeal. King and other SCLC leaders worked tirelessly to maintain confidence in nonviolent methods and to rally community after community against often discouraging odds. The SCLC succeeded again and again with nonviolent direct action and passive resistance campaigns. A seemingly endless cascade of demonstrations, marches, boycotts, and sit-ins confronted the practice of southern racism starting in the early 1960s. Occasionally the demonstrators were beaten back. Occasionally they were met with only token concessions. Cumulatively, however, their campaigns wore down the defense of jim crow and energized the African American community in the South to such an extent that reverting to the status quo of racial subordination became increasingly unthinkable.

It is important to realize that the movement's success drew upon earlier traditions of African American protest. Foremost, the work of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) lay much of the foundation for the modern civil rights movement. Since early in the century, the NAACP cultivated local civil rights leaders among its vast branch network in the South. Its conspicuous involvement in numerous, high-profile civil rights legal cases, leading up to the landmark ruling that demolished the constitutional approval of segregation in America, provided a popular example that African American assertiveness could triumph in American politics. Equally important, the constitutional victory in *Brown v. Board of Education* required the federal government to side with advocates of desegregation. In theory, at least, this deprived the white South and provided the civil rights movement with a powerful ally.

Reaching even further back in the history of the South was the network of African American women's clubs. Women's groups took the initiative to campaign for improved health care, housing, and elementary education. They organized domestic workers and openly supported antilynching legislation. They often raised funds for local NAACP branches and frequently served as secretaries and treasurers of those branches in the South. This tradition of feminine activism provided another source of strength and inspiration for the modern civil rights movement.

The Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters (BSCP) was the largest all—African American labor union in America. Its members passed through and often lived in the urban South. The porters spread the news that the segregation and racial oppression of the South was not a norm to which African Americans must submit. The message was reinforced by the

union's leader, A. Philip Randolph. Randolph was the earliest major African American political leader to advocate nonviolent direct action. His threat of an organized mass demonstration in the nation's capital in 1942 compelled President Franklin Roosevelt to issue an executive order banning discrimination in defense industries and federal agencies. Randolph's dramatic victory served to inspire civil rights activists while his rank and file among the BSCP quietly subverted acquiescence to the southern way of segregation.

The political left also played a role in energizing the civil rights movement. The Civil Rights Congress—although not southern based—took on several high-profile cases involving police brutality and abuses of sharecroppers in the South in the 1940s and 1950s. This organization won many admirers, a number of whom remained active in the civil rights movement in the era of the SCLC. The Highlander Folk School was another source of influence from the political left. Since the 1930s, Highlander tried to forge a progressive interracial coalition of labor unions, tenant farmers, educators, and religious leaders in the South. Its educational workshops were attended by such pillars of the modern civil rights movement as Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King, Jr. While relations with the political left often posed a liability to the SCLC by exposing it to the slander of red-baiters, leftist activists brought both energy and disciplined intellectual commitment to the ranks of the modern civil rights movement.

Beyond self-conscious racial reform movements, there were political and cultural trends in the 1940s and 1950s that fed the development of the SCLC. African American military service during World War II and Korea had an impact. Southern veterans who returned home after serving the cause of freedom were reluctant to acquiesce to inferior treatment. The action taken by President Harry Truman in ordering the desegregation of the armed services in 1948 provided additional momentum. Thereafter, southern African Americans served in the military with the express understanding that racial equality rather than segregation was the official policy of the United States armed services. Many local-level civil rights activists in the 1960s were military veterans.

Popular culture and the mass media also contributed to a spirit of African American pride and assertiveness that made possible an insurgent mass movement in the 1960s. The immense popularity of boxer Joe Louis, baseball star Jackie Robinson, and Olympian Jesse Owens in the 1930s, 1940s, and 1950s did much to enhance the African American self-image. Louis's victories over his white opponents, Robinson's stardom in a virtually all-white league, and Owens's dramatic refutation of Nazi racial pretensions provided indelible images of African American

achievements. These were living refutations of the segregationist belief in African American inferiority.

Finally, the African American ministry was poised to take advantage of the developments in the 1950s favoring a more assertive political style. The African American church had long been responsible for picking up the pieces left in the wake of racist oppression in the South. The counseling and consoling of violated females, providing of emotional and material relief for cheated sharecroppers, and eulogizing of innocent victims of white violence—these were almost daily tasks of the African American clergy throughout the South. Clergymen frequently served as ambassadors to the caucasian community in an effort to mediate disputes along the color line. As a result, many churches had for long expanded their activities beyond the traditional religious emphasis on the sacred. In doing this, they often risked their reputations in the larger community, their resources, and sometimes even their physical security. Many in the black ministry were of necessity shrewd political strategists. They were willing to embrace new political concepts if those concepts bore a fair chance of improving the lot of their people. King's philosophy of nonviolent direct action struck many as an opportune strategy for racial advancement and social justice.

The SCLC brought together religious leaders firmly grounded and committed to community service and uplift. In Dr. King's first book, *Stride Toward Freedom* (1958), the extended role for the church was cited. He wrote

any religion which professes to be concerned about the soul of men and is not concerned about the social and economic conditions that can scar the soul is a spiritually moribund religion only waiting the day to be buried...a religion true to its nature must also be concerned about many social conditions. Religion deals with both earth and heaven, both time and eternity.

Rev. T. J. Jemison of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, organized a bus boycott in 1953 and provided leadership in forming the United Defense League to address racial issues. The Baton Rouge transportation plan later served as the model used by the Montgomery Improvement Association (MIA) in its 1955 Montgomery bus boycott. The Inter-Civic Council in Tallahassee, Florida, was a combination of Florida A&M University students and the local community that vigorously protested segregation through boycott tactics led by Rev. C. K. Steele. The Alabama Christian Movement for Human Rights, under the leadership of Rev. Fred Shuttleworth, actively challenged the city of Birmingham's racist policies and procedures.

The Montgomery, Alabama, bus boycott movement reveals how the forces of African American political, religious, and feminine activism were converging into a new civil rights movement. The MIA was the result of

the response of the local NAACP, the Women's Political Caucus (WPC), and the Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance (IMA) to a specific incident that reflected traditional practices of social and civic injustice.

Ms. Rosa Parks, an African American seamstress, refused to give up her bus seat to a white passenger as required by custom and ordinance. Rosa Parks was consequently arrested. Jo Ann Robinson (WPC) and E. D. Nixon, community advocate, activist, and president of the state branch as well as the local branch of the NAACP, concurred that a bus boycott would be one means to protest the bus company's policies and the arrest of Rosa Parks. Nixon agreed to encourage the leaders and ministers of the city to unite in support of the protest efforts. However, Nixon was unable to attend the next day's meeting and the task of calling for a bus boycott fell to Rev. L. Roy Bennett of the IMA. Another mass meeting was held a few days later and there a new organization emerged, the Montgomery Improvement Association.

A young, charismatic minister active in support of the NAACP and committed to social and civic reform, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was called to serve as MIA president. Rev. Ralph Abernathy, another progressive, proactive minister, was elected as vice president. The MIA was bolstered by support from the NAACP, Fellowship of Reconciliation, Congress of Racial Equality, BSCP, and others. The bus boycott eventually forced the desegregation of Montgomery's buses. The success of the MIA boycott made an enormous impression on African American community leaders throughout the South. Many of them dreamed of emulating those direct action tactics to combat racial injustice in their own communities.

At a 1957 meeting of African American leaders (primarily ministers) held at Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta, Georgia, plans were made to mobilize a new coalition to address jim crow policies and procedures. Coretta Scott King, wife of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., presented the initial plans to the group in her husband's absence on the first day of the meeting (both Dr. King and Rev. Abernathy had rushed from Atlanta back to Montgomery in response to violence and reprisal in Montgomery). Dr. King returned to participate in the meeting. He later noted in Chapter 9 of Stride Toward Freedom that "There I found an enthusiastic group of almost a hundred men from all over the South committed to the idea of a southern movement to implement the Supreme Court's decision against bus segregation through nonviolent means...." The group sought to elect Dr. King as president of the new organization with the hope that he could replicate the success of Montgomery. Among those in atten-dance with Dr. and Mrs. King were Martin Luther King, Sr. (Dr. King's father), Ralph Abernathy, Fred Shuttleworth, Joseph Lowery, C. K. Steele, T. J. Jemison, and Bayard Rustin.

Initially the group was called the Southern Leadership Conference on Transportation and Nonviolent Integration. This new coalition of activists met a month later in New Orleans to elect officers and to review and expand the organization. The name of Southern Christian Leadership Conference was adopted. At subsequent meetings, the SCLC board of directors was organized and plans were made to hold an annual convention for legislative and inspirational purposes. The SCLC evolved to become a nonpartisan, interracial, ecumenical organization committed to nonviolent social change. Organized primarily as a means to duplicate the successes of the Montgomery bus boycott in other cities in the South, the SCLC selected King and Abernathy to serve in their old MIA roles.

From its beginning, the SCLC emerged to play an outstanding pivotal role in the civil rights movement. The organization dedicated itself to the abolition of racial discrimination mainly via (1) voter registration and political education and (2) nonviolent direct protest activity. SCLC goals were achieved through several sustained projects. In the early 1960s, the SCLC received foundation grants to train African Americans in the techniques of community leadership. Citizenship schools were set up to teach basic literacy skills and political education. The SCLC also received support to send teams to help organize voter registration campaigns in targeted communities. The organization also worked with the Southern Regional Council (SRC) in its Voter Education Project. One of the largest voter registration efforts was the 1965 Summer Community Organization and Political Education (SCOPE) Project. Over 1,200 SCOPE workers, including 650 college students from across the nation, 150 SCLC staff members, and 400 local volunteers, served in six southern states to register African Americans to vote.

One of the most publicized aspects of the SCLC was its skill in organizing and mobilizing at grassroots levels and its leadership in implementing nonviolent direct action campaigns across the South. (SCLC activists became known as "outside agitators.") Mass protest demonstrations were held in many communities. Some of the most notable campaigns were held in Albany, Georgia (1962); Birmingham, Alabama (1963); Selma, Alabama (1965); Chicago, Illinois (1966–67); and twice on a national level in Washington, D.C. (1963 and 1968). It is widely acknowledged that SCLC's Birmingham demonstrations directly influenced the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and that the Selma Campaign influenced the U.S. Congress to enact the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

Another form of direct action employed by the SCLC was the use of "selective buying campaigns." Employers whose products, services, or location were conspicuous in the African American community were encouraged to employ African American workers or use "minority"

services. If a firm refused to negotiate or change, an economic boycott was announced from local pulpits. The project was known as Operation Breadbasket. It was quite successful in the South, and in 1966 and 1967 SCLC launched major selective buying campaigns in forty cities.

In 1968, SCLC planned a Poor People's Campaign to be held in Washington, D.C. The goal of the campaign was to unite poor people from all races, ethnic groups, and regions to dramatize their plight and to seek redress. Dr. King interrupted his schedule to go to Memphis in support of striking sanitation workers. James Lawson of Memphis had requested that Dr. King lend his voice and leadership to the Memphis protest. It was to be Dr. King's final project. He was assassinated in Memphis on April 4, 1968. His prophetic speech, delivered the night before his assassination, foreshadowed his fate. Speaking with the soul, heart, and wisdom of a man who had come to terms with man's inhumanity to man, Dr. King stated,

Like anybody, I would like to live a long life. Longevity has its place. But I'm not concerned about that now. I just want to do God's will. And he's allowed me to go up to the mountain. And I've looked over. And I've seen the Promised Land. I may not get there with you. But I want you to know tonight that we, as a people will get to the Promised Land. And I'm happy tonight, I'm not worried about anything, I'm not fearing any man. Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord.

Dr. King was unable to witness his plan to bring the issue of poverty to the forefront of the American conscience. His murder ended a significant era in the history of the SCLC and in African American politics in general. Though the SCLC was aware of the many dangers and assaults that Dr. King faced, the organization, the African American world, and the nation were traumatized by his assassination. Mourners asked themselves, "Who could lead us as Dr. King had?" According to his successor, Rev. Ralph Abernathy, "no man, dead, living, or unborn could have filled the shoes of Dr. King."

Ralph Abernathy and other SCLC associates (Andrew Young, Hosea Williams, C. T. Vivian, Bernard Lafayette, Jesse Jackson) worked to bring Dr. King's dream of the Poor People's Campaign to reality. Activists and protesters from across the country traveled to Washington, D.C., and established Resurrection City to bring attention to the issue of poverty. Perhaps Rev. Abernathy was correct when he stated, "Markedly, the dynamics of the organization were changed by the void left by Dr. King." However, the SCLC did continue to work to address the issues to which Dr. King had dedicated his life and ministry. The SCLC has remained an important organization in the struggle for racial, social, and economic justice under the leadership of Rev. Abernathy and later under Rev. Joseph Lowery.

It is important to note that with the exception of the papers of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (1954–1968) housed in the King Library and Archives at the King Center in Atlanta, the SCLC records provide one of the best opportunities to view the philosophical temperament and the commitment of Dr. King. In addition to revealing much about the thoughts and activities of Dr. King, the collection also documents the roles of other key African American figures such as Andrew Young, Ralph Abernathy, Ella Baker, Septima Clark, Coretta Scott King, Hosea Williams, C. T. Vivian, Wyatt T. Walker, Randolph Blackwell, Joseph Lowery, Jesse Jackson, and Marion Wright Edelman, as well as the voices of countless activists who were lesser known but critical in the work and success of the SCLC and the civil rights movement.

The SCLC records also provide a critical understanding of the social changes in this period of American history and of the organization's prominence as an agent of that social change. The archival files show how the SCLC was able to influence public laws and politics and bring to the forefront profound changes in American (particularly southern) race relations. These records document firsthand virtually all of the major southern civil rights campaigns. In addition, the collection provides an excellent overview of the development, complexity, and scope of the SCLC.

University Publications of America's microfilm publication of the SCLC collection assures the widespread dissemination of these records central to the life work of Dr. King. In this, the publication furthers his vision of a community based upon human understanding and enriches our own understanding of a dynamic social movement that has had a profound impact on American life.

# **SCOPE & CONTENT NOTE**

The files of the Records of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, 1954–1970, Part 3: Records of the Public Relations Department provide a good overview of the entire SCLC history from about 1960 when the department was established to disseminate information on Dr. King and the organization. Regular press releases and newsletters document all of the major episodes of the SCLC up through 1966. The records also provide much pertinent biographical material on King, including documentation of the mass media's growing interest in the SCLC leader. In addition, the Public Relations Department files hold an incomplete set of records of SCLC annual conventions and board of directors meetings dating from 1959.

The Public Relations Department files are broken into thirteen separate series, and some of these are in turn divided into subseries. The first eight series are Correspondence and Office Files of Public Relations Department directors and their research assistants. More substantive material begins in Series IX at Frame 0120 of Reel 3 with Publications. These include SCLC press releases, newsletters, brochures, leaflets, and information booklets. Series X through XIII contain biographies of civil rights leaders, subject files, fund-raising records, and files on the SCLC conventions and board of directors meetings.

Series I, Records of James R. Wood, 1960–1961 contains two Correspondence Files and a small Subject File kept by Wood, who served as director of the Public Relations Department from 1960 to 1961. The first correspondence file, consisting of three folders, covers fund-raising for SCLC scholarships; aid for victims of economic reprisals in Fayette County, Tennessee; African American boycott actions; reactions to red-baiting and persecution of civil rights activist Carl Braden; SCLC relations with Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE); attacks on Freedom Riders in Alabama; and voter registration work in the South. The second series of Wood's correspondence, also consisting of three folders, is with noted civil rights activist Anne Braden. A good deal of the correspondence concerns the Southern Conference Educational Fund (SCEF) that Anne and her husband Carl Braden led. A recurrent topic is the persecution of Carl Braden for his

refusal to testify before the U.S. House Un-American Activities Committee. The Alphabetical File also consists of only three files, the first on the philosophy of Christian nonviolence and the other two on routine office matters.

Series II, Records of Gould Maynard, Director, 1962, beginning at Frame 0196 of Reel I, contains two folders of the Public Relations Director's Files for 1962. The files contain information on the arrest of Martin Luther King, Jr. and Ralph David Abernathy in Albany, Georgia, and on employment discrimination in Atlanta, Georgia, in addition to requests for information about Dr. King.

Series III, Records of Jane M. Bond, Research Assistant, 1960–1963, beginning at Frame 0223 of Reel 1, consists of a chronological Correspondence File spanning eleven folders. Topics covered include civil rights demonstrations in Orangeburg, South Carolina; activities of SNCC; studies on the impact of de facto segregation on children; the Albany, Georgia, civil rights movement; freedom rides; race prejudice in Protestant religious education; housing discrimination; the Burnt Churches Fund; the civil rights movement in Birmingham, Alabama; police brutality in Atlanta, Georgia, and Los Angeles, California; employment discrimination; the philosophy of nonviolent direct action; and the SCLC Citizenship Education Program.

Series IV, Records of Edward T. Clayton, Director, 1963–1965, beginning at Frame 0555 of Reel 1 and continuing through Frame 0836 of Reel 2, contains the largest body of Public Relations Director's Files. There are two large Correspondence Files, the first arranged by date and the second arranged alphabetically by subject. The chronological correspondence file spans twenty-two folders. Its highlights include correspondence on the North Carolina voters movement; the SCLC Citizenship Education Project; the 1963 March on Washington; African American boycott strategies; policies of the SNCC; the NAACP voter registration campaign in Greenville, South Carolina; the United Nations; African diplomats; world peace; the Tuscaloosa, Alabama, bus boycott; the Selma, Alabama, march; and numerous speaking engagements of Martin Luther King, Jr.

The Alphabetical File (Subseries 2), beginning at Frame 0114 of Reel 2, concerns employment of African Americans at Best Foods Corp.; the Canadian Broadcasting Company documentary on the King family; the CBS News "Face the Nation" appearance by Martin Luther King, Jr.; an employment discrimination complaint against the Atlanta, Georgia, Typographical Union; requests by TV and radio stations for appearances by Martin Luther King, Jr.; relief for victims of white economic reprisals in Mississippi; Federal Bureau of Investigation inquiry into Mississippi civil rights cases; voter registration and

citizenship education programs in Mississippi; reviews of books on the civil rights movement; a Lena Horne benefit concert; Coretta Scott King benefit concerts; Sammy Davis Jr. benefit performance; the *Playboy* magazine interview with Martin Luther King, Jr.; SCLC convention publicity; and information on SCLC initiatives in St. Augustine, Florida, and Birmingham, Alabama.

Series V, Records of Jonathan Chaffee, 1965 begins at Frame 0837 of Reel 2. This small series comprises two folders of a research assistant's office file. The highlight is a bibliography of magazine articles on Martin Luther King, Jr.

Series VI, Records of Xernona Clayton, 1965, beginning at Frame 0888 of Reel 2, consists of one folder of a research assistant's office file. This contains correspondence with Coretta Scott King on plans for a party for underprivileged children.

Series VII, Records of Junius Griffin, [1964,] 1965–1966, beginning at Frame 0908 of Reel 2, consists of an eight-folder alphabetical Correspondence File. The file touches upon SCLC voter registration work, the Chicago campaign, the arrest of civil rights demonstrators in Demopolis, Alabama, Public Relations itineraries for Martin Luther King, Jr. and Andrew Young, and guidelines for the Public Relations Department.

Series VIII, Records of Thomas Offenburger, 1967–1968, beginning at Frame 0001 of Reel 3, is also a small file series consisting of eight folders of Public Relations Director's files. Much of the material in this series follows the assassination of Martin Luther King, Jr. However, there are materials on white backlash against SCLC demonstrations in Chicago, cooperation with the anti–Vietnam War movement, and planning memoranda for the Poor People's Campaign.

Series IX, Publications, 1958, 1960–1966[, 1967–1968]. This series is the heart of the Public Relations Department records. It begins on Frame 0126 of Reel 3. One file of 1958 press releases antedates the establishment of the Public Relations Department in 1960. The 1958 folder includes three important statements of Martin Luther King, Jr.: one is a statement to President Eisenhower requesting presidential action on civil rights; another follows his arrest for "loitering" in Montgomery, Alabama; and the third is a statement given after an assassination attempt upon him in New York City.

Beginning in 1960, fifty-nine folders of press releases document the SCLC perspective on virtually every campaign or demonstration the movement undertook. Along with reports on SCLC activities, there are numerous statements by Martin Luther King, Jr. among the press releases. These document King's reaction to developments in the civil rights movement as well as to current events.

Following the press releases, a subseries of SCLC newsletters begins at Frame 0194 of Reel 4. The first two issues of the newsletter, called *The Crusader*, were published in 1959. Regular publication did not begin until 1961, however, when the title was dropped and the newsletter assumed the more professional form it was to take until it ceased publication in 1966. Published approximately six times each year, the newsletter provides a good narrative and photographic history of the role of the SCLC in the civil rights movement. It includes feature articles by Martin Luther King, Jr., Edward T. Clayton, Wyatt T. Walker, Andrew J. Young, Ralph Abernathy, Dorothy Cotton, Septima P. Clark, and Sarah Patton Boyle. Three issues are missing: Spring 1963, January 1964, and Summer 1965.

The third and final subseries of the Publications File is called Miscellaneous Publications. It includes brochures for the Citizenship Education Program, Operation Dialogue, Summer Community Organization and Political Education (SCOPE) project, and other SCLC programs, especially voting registration drives. There are special publications dedicated to the March on Washington, the Selma march, and various local campaigns and demonstrations. The subseries begins at Frame 0416 of Reel 4.

Series X, Biographies, [1954,] 1957–1968[, 1970]. These were compiled by the Public Relations Department; some are still in the form of newspaper clippings or magazine articles. Biography subjects include SCLC staff members such as Harry Boyte, Ella J. Baker, Dorothy Cotton, Randolph Blackwell, and Septima Clark, as well as SCLC leaders like Ralph Abernathy, Martin Luther King, Jr., Joseph E. Lowery, Fred Shuttlesworth, C. K. Steele, Wyatt T. Walker, and Andrew J. Young. In addition, there are biographies of many civil rights leaders outside of the SCLC including Carl Braden, Stokely Carmichael, James Farmer, Aaron Henry, Benjamin L. Hooks, John R. Lewis, Constance Baker Motley, A. Philip Randolph, Bayard Rustin, and Whitney M. Young. These files are arranged alphabetically from Frame 0745 of Reel 4 through Frame 0450 of Reel 5.

Series XI, Subject File, 1961–1968. This was the file of Carole Hoover, special projects director for the SCLC. It is uncertain how the file wound up in the records of the Public Relations Department. Files concern the A. Philip Randolph Institute; the Selma, Alabama, march; the American Jewish Committee; race riots in Watts; the Congress of Racial Equality; the Council of Federated Organizations; the Albany, Georgia, movement and other campaigns in Georgia; the U.S. House Committee on Un-American Activities; Jobs Corps legislation; Lawyers Constitutional Defense Committee; Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party; violent reprisals in Mississippi; employment discrimination by

the Illinois State Employment Service; activities of the NAACP; the St. Augustine, Florida, movement; the Southern Conference Educational Fund; the Southern Regional Council; and the Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee. At the end of the series is a news clipping file on the civil rights movement, with special reference to the SCLC. The series runs from Frame 0451 of Reel 5 through Frame 0321 of Reel 7.

Series XII, Records of Fund-raising, [1963,] 1964–1967[, 1968]. These are files on fund-raising events that the Public Relations Department promoted. Events include a benefit concert by Harry Belafonte, a show by Sammy Davis Jr., and a dinner for Rep. Charles C. Diggs. In addition, there are mailing lists and internal memoranda on fundraising strategies. The series runs from Frame 0322 through 0831 of Reel 7.

Series XIII, Records of Conventions and Board Meetings, 1959–1969. This incomplete series is arranged by date. Each year contains a mix of various SCLC convention materials and documents presented to the Board of Directors. The mix includes committee reports, financial reports, executive director's reports, president's reports, speeches, SCLC departmental reports, press kits, press releases, and a considerable amount of background correspondence pertaining both to board meetings and annual conventions. There are also reports on major SCLC programs such as Operation Breadbasket, the Chicago Project, Voter Registration and Political Education, and the Citizenship Education Project. Many of the speeches found here are by notables including Anne Braden, Jackie Robinson, Jacob K. Javits, William Kunstler, Andrew Young, Edward M. Kennedy, and Sidney Poitier. The series begins at Frame 0832 of Reel 7 and runs through all of Reels 8, 9, and 10.

## INTRODUCTION

The Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) profoundly affected the modern civil rights movement as well as the course of American political history in the second half of the twentieth century. The organization's records provide researchers with a treasure of primary source material on the complexities of organizing a successful mass protest movement. Organizational working papers, internal memoranda, correspondence, minutes of meetings, field reports, press releases and pamphlet publications, questionnaire replies and statistical compilations, and many other types of documents bring to light the struggle for civil rights. Making these records widely available in microform provides students, scholars, or any curious researcher with the opportunity to experience the inner workings of this pivotal force in the modern civil rights movement.

The SCLC embodied the vision and philosophy of its founding president, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., as well as the hopes, aspirations, and energy of countless community leaders and local activists throughout the United States. King's philosophy of nonviolent direct action and his vision for a mass movement based upon the Christian tenets of love and understanding guided the activities of the SCLC. Although there were precursors to this vision, such as the philosophies of labor leader A. Philip Randolph and of the pacifists organized under the Fellowship of Reconciliation, nonviolent direct action became a major force in American politics for the first time under the leadership of King and the SCLC.

The SCLC leaders had no illusions about either the danger or the difficulty of challenging the tyranny of Jim Crow in southern life. Fear of reprisals were well justified in light of traditions of lynching, police brutality, and economic discrimination in the South. Instilling the will, strength, and courage to throw off a lifetime of subordination and dehumanization under jim crow was an ambitious undertaking. There were divisions within the African American population of the South and there were apprehensions about the formidable force of southern racism. These were considerable obstacles against the creation of a mass movement. Yet the realization of their race's desperate situation, its

constant denigration and psychological burden in southern society spurred African American leaders to action.

Among the disparate groups and individuals who flocked to the SCLC, the ethic of nonviolence gained wide appeal. King and other SCLC leaders worked tirelessly to maintain confidence in nonviolent methods and to rally community after community against often discouraging odds. The SCLC succeeded again and gain with nonviolent direct action and passive resistance campaigns. A seemingly endless cascade of demonstrations, marches, boycotts, and sit-ins confronted the practice of southern racism starting in the early 1960s. Occasionally the demonstrators were beaten back. Occasionally they were met with only token concessions. Cumulatively, however, their campaigns wore down the defense of jim crow and energized the African American community in the south to such an extent that reverting to the status quo of racial subordination became increasingly unthinkable.

It is important to realize that the movement's success drew upon earlier traditions of African American protest. Foremost, the work of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) lay much of the foundation for the modern civil rights movement. Since early in the century, the NAACP cultivated local civil rights leaders among its vast branch network in the South. Its conspicuous involvement in numerous, high-profile civil rights legal cases, leading up to the landmark ruling that demolished the constitutional approval of segregation in America, provided a popular example that African American assertiveness could triumph in American politics. Equally important, the constitutional victory in Brown v. Board of Education required the federal government to side with advocates of desegregation. In theory, at least, this deprived the white South and provided the civil rights movement with a powerful ally.

Reaching even further back in the history of the South was the network of African American women's clubs. Women's groups took the initiative to campaign for improved health care, housing, and elementary education. They organized domestic workers and openly supported antilynching legislation. They often raised funds for local NAACP branches and frequently served as secretaries and treasurers of those branches in the South. This tradition of feminine activism provided another source of strength and inspiration for the modern civil rights movement.

The Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters (BSCP) was the largest all—African American labor union in America. Its members passed through and often lived in the urban South. The porters spread the news that the segregation and racial oppression of the South was not a norm to which African Americans must submit. The message was reinforced by the

union's leader, A. Philip Randolph. Randolph was the earliest major African American political leader to advocate nonviolent direct action. His threat of an organized mass demonstration in the nation's capital in 1942 compelled President Franklin Roosevelt to issue an executive order banning discrimination in defense industries and federal agencies. Randolph's dramatic victory served to inspire civil rights activists while his rank and file among the BSCP quietly subverted acquiescence to the southern way of segregation.

The political left also played a role in energizing the civil rights movement. The Civil Rights Congress—although not southern based—took on several high-profile cases involving police brutality and abuses of sharecroppers in the South in the 1940s and 1950s. This organization won many admirers, a number of whom remained active in the civil rights movement in the era of the SCLC. The Highlander Folk School was another source of influence from the political left. Since the 1930s, Highlander tried to forge a progressive interacial coalition of labor unions, tenant farmers, educators, and religious leaders in the South. Its educational workshops were attended by such pillars of the modern civil rights movement as Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King, Jr. While relations with the political left often posed a liability to the SCLC by exposing it to the slander of red-baiters, leftist activists brought both energy and disciplined intellectual committment to the ranks of the modern civil rights movement.

Beyond self-conscious racial reform movements, there were political and cultural trends in the 1940s and 1950s that fed the development of the SCLC. African American military service during World War II and Korea had an impact. Southern veterans who returned home after serving the cause of freedom were reluctant to acquiesce in inferiority. The action taken by President Harry Truman in ordering the desegregation of the Armed Services in 1948 provided additional momentum. Thereafter, southern African Americans serving in the military served with the express understanding that racial equality rather than segregation was the official policy of the United States armed services. Many local-level civil rights activists in the 1960s were military veterans.

Popular culture and the mass media also contributed to a spirit of African American pride and assertiveness that made possible an insurgent mass movement in the 1960s. The immense popularity of boxer Joe Louis, baseball star Jackie Robinson, and olympian Jesse Owens in the 1930s, 1940s, and 1950s did much to enhance the African American self-image. Louis's victories over his white opponents, Robinson's stardom in a virtually all-white league, and Owens's dramatic refutation of Nazi racial pretensions provided indelible images of African American

achievements. These were living refutations of the segregationist belief in black inferiority.

Finally, the African American ministry was also poised to take advantage of the developments favoring a more assertive political style in the 1950s. The black church had long been responsible for picking up the pieces left in the wake of racist oppression in the South. The counseling and consoling of violated females, providing emotional and material relief for cheated sharecroppers, eulogizing of innocent victims of white violence—these were almost daily tasks of the African American clergy throughout the South. Clergymen frequently served as ambassadors to the caucasian community in an effort to mediate disputes along the color line. As a result many churches had for long expanded their activities beyond the traditional religious emphasis on the sacred. In doing this, they often risked their reputations in the larger community, their resources, and sometimes even their physical security. Many in the black ministry were of necessity shrewd political strategists. They were willing to embrace new political concepts if those concepts bore a fair chance of improving the lot of their people. King's philosophy of non-violent direct action struck many as an opportune strategy for racial advancement and social justice.

The SCLC brought together religious leaders firmly grounded and committed to community service and uplift. In Dr. King's first book, Stride Toward Freedom (1958), the extended role for the church was cited. He wrote

any religion which professes to be concerned about the soul of men and is not concerned about the social and economic conditions that can scar the soul is a spiritually moribund religion only waiting the day to be buried...a religion true to its nature must also be concerned about many social conditions. Religion deals with both earth and heaven, both time and eternity.

Rev. T. J. Jemison of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, organized a bus boycott in 1953 and provided leadership in forming the United Defense League to address racial issues. The Baton Rouge transportation plan later served as the model used by the Montgomery Improvement Association (MIA) in its 1955 Montgomery bus boycott. The Inter-Civic Council in Tallahassee, Florida, was a combination of Florida A&M University students and the local community that vigorously protested segregation through boycott tactics led by Rev.

C. K. Steele. The Alabama Christian Movement for Human Rights, under the leadership of Rev. Fred Shuttleworth, actively challenged the city of Birmingham's racist policies and procedures.

The Montgomery, Alabama, bus boycott movement reveals how the forces of African American political, religious, and feminine activism were

converging into a new civil rights movement. The MIA was the result of the response of the local NAACP, the Women's Political Caucus (WPC), and the Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance (IMA) to a specific incident that reflected traditional practices of social and civic injustice.

Ms. Rosa Parks, an African American seamstress, refused to give up her bus seat to a white passenger as required by custom and ordinance. Rosa Parks was consequently arrested. Jo Ann Robinson (WPC) and E. D. Nixon, community advocate, activist, and president of the state branch as well as the local branch of the NAACP, concurred that a bus boycott would be one means to protest the bus company's policies and the arrest of Rosa Parks. Nixon agreed to encourage the leaders and ministers of the city to unite in support of the protest efforts. However, Nixon was unable to attend the next day's meeting and the task of calling for a bus boycott fell to Rev. L. Roy Bennett of the Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance. Another mass meeting was held a few days later and there a new organization emerged, the Montgomery Improvement Association.

A young, charismatic minister active in support of the NAACP and committed to social and civic reform, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was called to serve as MIA president. Rev. Ralph Abernathy, another progressive, proactive minister, was elected as vice president. The MIA was bolstered by support from the NAACP, Fellowship of Reconciliation, Congress of Racial Equality, Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, and others. The bus boycott eventually forced the desegregation of Montgomery's buses. The success of the MIA boycott made an enormous impression on African American community leaders throughout the South. Many of them dreamed of emulating those direct action tactics to combat racial injustice in their own communities.

At a 1957 meeting of African American leaders (primarily ministers) held at Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta, Georgia, plans were made to mobilize a new coalition to address jim crow policies and procedures. Coretta Scott King, wife of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., presented the initial plans to the group in her husband's absence on the first day of the meeting (both Dr. King and Rev. Abernathy had rushed from Atlanta back to Montgomery in response to violence and reprisal in Montgomery). Dr. King returned to participate in the meeting. He later noted in Chapter 9 of Stride Toward Freedom (1958) that "There I found an enthusiastic group of almost a hundred men from all over the South committed to the idea of a southern movement to implement the Supreme Court's decision against bus segregation through nonviolent means...." The group sought to elect Dr. King as president of the new organization with the hope that he could replicate the success in Montgomery. Among those in attendance with Dr. and Mrs. King were Martin Luther King Sr. (Dr.King's

father), Ralph Abernathy, Fred Shuttleworth, Joseph Lowery, C. K. Steele, T. J. Jemison, and Bayard Rustin.

Initially the group was called the Southern Leadership Conference on Transportation and Nonviolent Integration. This new coalition of activists met a month later in New Orleans to elect officers and to review, and expand the organization. The name of Southern Christian Leadership Conference was adopted. At subsequent meetings, the SCLC board of directors was organized and plans were made to hold an annual convention for legislative and inspirational purposes. The SCLC evolved to become a nonpartisan, interracial, ecumenical organization committed to nonviolent social change. Organized primarily as a means to duplicate the successes of the Montgomery bus boycott in other cities in the South, the SCLC selected King and Abernathy to serve in their old MIA roles.

From its beginning, the SCLC emerged to play an outstanding pivotal role in the civil rights movement. The organization dedicated itself to the abolition of racial discrimination mainly via (1) voter registration and political education and (2) nonviolent direct protest activity. SCLC goals were achieved through several sustained projects. In the early 1960s, the SCLC received foundation grants to train African Americans in the techniques of community leadership. Citizenship schools were set up to teach basic literacy skills and political education. The SCLC also received support to send teams to help organize voter registration campaigns in targeted communities. The organization also worked with the Southern Regional Council (SRC) in its Voter Education Project. One of the largest voter registration efforts was the 1965 Summer Community Organization and Political Education (SCOPE) Project. Over 1,200 SCOPE workers, including 650 college students from across the nation, 150 SCLC staff members, and 400 local volunteers, served in six southern states to register African Americans to vote.

One of the most publicized aspects of the SCLC was its skill in organizing and mobilizing at grassroots levels and its leadership in implementing nonviolent direct action campaigns across the South. (SCLC activists became known as "outside agitators.") Mass protest demonstrations were held in many communities. Some of the most notable campaigns were held in Albany, Georgia (1962); Birmingham, Alabama (1963); Selma, Alabama (1965); Chicago, Illinois (1966–67); and twice on a national level in Washington, D.C. (1963 and 1968). It is widely acknowledged that SCLC's Birmingham demonstrations directly influenced the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and that the Selma Campaign influenced the U.S. Congress to enact the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

Another form of direct action employed by the SCLC was the use of "selective buying campaigns." Employers whose products, services, or

location were conspicuous in the African American community were encouraged to employ African American workers or use "minority" services. If a firm refused to negotiate or change, an economic boycott was announced from local pulpits. The project was known as Operation Breadbasket. It was quite successful in the South, and in 1966 and 1967 SCLC launched major selective buying campaigns in forty cities.

In 1968, SCLC planned a Poor People's Campaign to be held in Washington, D.C. The goal of the campaign was to unite poor people from all races, ethnic groups, and regions to dramatize their plight and to seek redress. Dr. King interrupted his schedule to go to Memphis in support of striking sanitation workers. James Lawson of Memphis requested that Dr. King lend his voice and leadership to the Memphis protest. It was to be Dr. King's final project. He was assassinated in Memphis on April 4, 1968. His prophetic speech delivered the night before his assassination, foreshadowed his fate. Speaking with the soul, heart, and wisdom of a man who had come to terms with man's inhumanity to man, Dr. King stated,

Like anybody, I would like to live a long life. Longevity has its place. But I'm not concerned about that now. I just want to do God's will. And he's allowed me to go up to the mountain. And I've looked over. And I've seen the Promised Land. I may not get there with you. But I want you to know tonight that we, as a people will get to the Promised Land. And I'm happy tonight, I'm not worried about anything, I'm not fearing any man. Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord.

Dr. King was unable to witness his plan to bring the issue of poverty to the forefront of the American conscience. His murder ended a significant era in the history of the SCLC and in African American politics in general. Though the SCLC was aware of the many dangers and assaults that Dr. King faced, the organization, the African American world, and the nation were traumatized by his assassination. Mourners asked themselves, "Who could lead us as Dr. King had?" According to his successor, Rev. Ralph Abernathy, "no man, dead, living, or unborn could have filled the shoes of Dr. King."

Ralph Abernathy and other SCLC associates (Andrew Young, Hosea Williams, C. T. Vivian, Bernard Lafayette, Jesse Jackson) worked to bring Dr. King's dream of the Poor People's Campaign to reality. Activists and protesters from across the country traveled to Washington, D.C., and established Resurrection City to bring attention to the issue of poverty. Perhaps Rev. Abernathy was correct when he stated, "Markedly, the dynamics of the organization were changed by the void left by Dr. King." However, the SCLC did continue to work to address the issues to which Dr. King had dedicated his life and ministry. The SCLC has remained an important organization in the struggle for racial, social, and economic

justice under the leadership of Rev. Abernathy and later under Rev. Joseph Lowery.

It is important to note that with the exception of the papers of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (1954–1968) housed in the King Library and Archives at the King Center in Atlanta, the SCLC records provide one of the best opportunities to view the philosophical temperament and the commitment of Dr. King. In addition to revealing much about the thoughts and activities of Dr. King, the collection also documents the roles of other key African American figures such as Andrew Young, Ralph Abernathy, Ella Baker, Septima Clark, Coretta Scott King, Hosea Williams, C. T. Vivian, Wyatt T. Walker, Randolph Blackwell, Joseph Lowery, Jesse Jackson, and Marion Wright Edelman, as well as the voices of countless activists who were lesser known but critical in the work and success of the SCLC and the civil rights movement.

The SCLC records also provide a critical understanding of the social changes in this period of American history and the organization's prominence as an agent of that social change. The archival files show how the SCLC was able to influence public laws and politics and bring to the forefront profound changes in American (particularly southern) race relations. These records document firsthand virtually all of the major southern civil rights campaigns. In addition, the collection provides an excellent overview of the development, complexity, and scope of the SCLC.

University Publications of America's microfilm publication of the SCLC collection assures the widespread dissemination of these records central to the life work of Dr. King. In this, the publication that furthers his vision of a community based upon human understanding and enriches our own understanding of a dynamic social movement that has had a profound impact on American life.

## **SCOPE & CONTENT NOTE**

The files of the Records of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, 1954–1970, Part 4: Records of the Program Department offer some of the most outstanding research opportunities in the SCLC collection. They include a wealth of primary material from the front lines of the civil rights movement, including field reports, survey materials, and correspondence. Researchers should also consult indexes to the user guides for the previous three parts of the Records of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, 1954–1970. Many of the programs documented in Part 4 are discussed in correspondence and memoranda found in Part 1: Records of the President's Office and in Part 2: Records of the Executive Director and Treasurer. In addition, the press releases and publicity materials found in Part 3: Records of the Public Relations Department may also cover events that are detailed in the Program Department files.

The Program Department supervised all of the outreach programs of the SCLC, including the field staff, voter registration and political education projects, Operation Breadbasket, and Operation Dialogue. The files of Program Director and later Executive Director Andrew J. Young are particularly fruitful. They include project proposals, copies of many of his speeches and essays, and correspondence relating to the activities of Martin Luther King, Jr. Reports from members of the field staff found in Young's files graphically illustrate the poverty and social injustices that were common in the rural and urban South.

In the summer of 1961, the SCLC received financial assistance from the Field Foundation and the American Missionary Association to organize citizenship schools. These were to enable rural southern African Americans to register to vote and participate in community affairs. Andrew J. Young, at that time on the staff of the National Council of Churches, was hired by the SCLC to administer the project. Soon, however, his responsibilities were expanded to include supervision of all SCLC outreach programs, including the Voter Registration Project, Operation Breadbasket, and Operation Dialogue. When Young assumed the position of executive director in 1964, Randolph T. Blackwell became program director.

There are eight separate subseries of the Records of the Program Department. Series I and II consist of the records of Andrew J. Young and Randolph T. Blackwell. (Records of Bernard Lafayette, program director from 1966 to 1967, are not in the SCLC collection.) Series III through VIII contain the records of individual program offices, including the Citizenship Education Program, Voter Registration and Political Education, Operation Breadbasket, Operation Dialogue, Peace Education Project, and the Poor People's Campaign.

#### Series I, Records of Andrew J. Young, Program Director, 1961–1964

In addition to administering the Citizenship Education Program, Andrew Young supervised the SCLC's massive voter registration campaigns, the army of volunteer workers located in rural southern communities, and the direct-action campaigns in Albany, Georgia, and Birmingham, Alabama. He frequently served as an aide and traveling companion to Dr. King and to Wyatt T. Walker, executive director of the SCLC, and acted as a liaison between the SCLC and religious and civic groups.

The records document Young's relationship with religious organizations, activities of the SCLC voter registration staff, and administration of the Citizenship Education Program (CEP). There are three further subdivisions of the Andrew Young files: (1) Office Files, (2) Records of the Citizenship Education Program, and (3) Records of the Voter Education Project.

The Office Files include correspondence on the SCLC demonstrations in Albany, Georgia; correspondence with Jack O'Dell, a key SCLC liaison in New York City; and correspondence with numerous religious organizations. Material on lawsuits filed over SCLC demonstrations in St. Augustine, Florida, as well as speeches and articles by Young and by SCLC staffer James Bevel are also included.

The CEP includes correspondence with the American Missionary Association, the Field Foundation, the Highlander Folk School, and the United Churches of Christ. There are financial statements and statistics on the program as well as memoranda and reports. More complete records on the CEP are in Series III, described below.

Young's Voter Education Project (VEP) files document the funding of the program by the Field and Taconic Foundations and administrative assistance by the Southern Regional Council. Highlights of the material include monthly reports from field secretaries, volunteer workers, and local organizers dispatched by the SCLC to areas where obstruction of African American voter registration had occurred. There are a substantial number of reports from Gadsden and Birmingham, Alabama; from the Southeast Georgia Crusade for Voters, led by Rev. Hosea Williams; from

the Statewide Registration Committee of Georgia; and from civil rights activists in Louisiana, Mississippi, and North Carolina. The Mississippi file contains a significant amount of print material by the Council of Federated Organizations (COFO).

#### Series II, Records of Randolph T. Blackwell, 1963-1966

Blackwell, a lawyer and college professor, joined the SCLC staff in 1962 to work for the VEP. He became field director of the VEP in 1963 and served through some of the most bitter voting rights campaigns in the South. He was elevated to program director in 1964 and served until July 1964, when he left to found Southern Rural Action, Inc. His files are less extensive than those of Andrew Young, but they include valuable correspondence documenting cooperation between the SCLC and the American Civil Liberties Union and also with the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC). There are four subgroups to Blackwell's files: (1) Office Files (2) Records of the Voter Education Project, (3) Records of Direct Action, Alabama, and (4) Records of Direct Action, Chicago. There is material on the Selma March, on school desegregation in Grenada, Mississippi, and on various selective buying campaigns. Field reports from activists in the Voter Education Campaign are contained in separate files under the VEP heading. There is a fairly large series on direct-action programs in Alabama, which includes material on selective buying campaigns, the Selma March, and brutality against civil rights workers. A similar series on direct-action programs in Chicago contains neighborhood surveys and publications of civil rights groups in that city.

# Series III, Records of the Citizenship Education Program, 1956–1967

The CEP was established in 1960 when Septima P. Clark, a literacy teacher at the Highlander Folk School, convinced Martin Luther King, Jr. that literacy training and political education would spur voter registration among African Americans in the South. Highlander Folk School's CEP was disintegrating under pressure from the hostile Tennessee State government, and the SCLC essentially took over the Highlander program, bringing Clark on to smooth the transition. The CEP series is made up of the papers of four of the staff members—Robert L. Green, Dorothy F. Cotton, Septima P. Clark, and Annell Ponder—as well as a massive file of school reports.

Robert Green was an associate professor of education at Michigan State University who served as a consultant to the CEP beginning in 1962. In 1965 he became director of education for the SCLC, a position he held through 1966. Green's files contain background material,

proposals, and budgets for education programs; reports on the operation of the CEP; and materials on education and desegregation conferences that the SCLC attended or sponsored.

Dorothy Cotton also served as SCLC director of education, beginning in 1960. The files document Cotton's outreach strategy among African American voluntary associations throughout the South. Her correspondence underscores the determination of the SCLC to reach into the grass roots of the southern African American community and describes the early organization of the Citizenship School program. Incoming letters from local civil rights activists document the CEP's impact. Correspondents sometimes discuss current events in the civil rights cause, such as church bombings, voter registration campaigns, and the CEP itself. The correspondence for 1961 documents the close relationship between the SCLC and the Highlander Folk School. The Alphabetical File in the Cotton subseries contains brochures and pamphlets distributed by the CEP. There is also a large selection of workbooks that were used by literacy teachers in the program.

Septima Clark's files are among the most rewarding subseries among the CEP records. Clark was a pioneer in literacy training. She spent a lengthy career as a teacher on Johns Island, South Carolina, and became an instructor in adult education for the Highlander Folk School in the 1950s. In 1961 she joined the SCLC staff as supervisor of teacher training. Her correspondence documents the harassment of the Highlander Folk School by Tennessee State authorities and the complexities in funding the CEP at the SCLC without offending financial backers with associations to Highlander. Clark's Alphabetical File includes workshop material and teacher surveys.

Annell Ponder's papers is the smallest series among CEP records. Correspondence covers recruitment of teachers and relations with Council of Federated Organizations (COFO) in Mississippi. The Alphabetical File includes field reports from CEP workers as well as material on COFO and SNCC.

The massive file of School Reports covers scores of schools throughout the South. Much of the material is attendance reports. Collectively, they provide a panoptic survey of grassroots response to educational opportunities in the South in the early 1960s. The reports are also valuable because of questionnaire responses by local CEP teachers about ways in which they have helped their community. The reports are arranged alphabetically by state and community, making them easily accessible for community study research.

# Series IV, Records of the Voter Registration and Political Education Project, 1963–1968

Voter registration was always a primary function of the civil rights organizations. This was intensified by input of voter education funds by the Southern Regional Council between 1962 and 1968. In 1964, Hosea Williams, a native of Savannah, Georgia, was added to the SCLC staff as director of the Voter Registration Department. This series consists of the general Office Files; a file on the Summer Community Organization and Political Education Program (SCOPE), 1965; and a file on the Records of the Chicago Project, 1965–1967. None of these subseries is particularly large. Researchers will find more material on voter registration in the Andrew J. Young and Randolph T. Blackwell series described above. The Alphabetical File contains scattered field reports and material from the Georgia Voters League and the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party.

#### Series V, Records of Operation Breadbasket, 1962–1968

Operation Breadbasket was the program to pressure local businesses to hire African American workers from the community. It was begun in 1962 in Atlanta under the directorship of Rev. Fred Bennette Jr. But the tactic was used throughout the urban South—particularly against department stores and other downtown retailers. Typically a group of African American ministers, under SCLC counsel, visited local businesses to negotiate the hiring of African American workers, especially in job categories from which African Americans had been traditionally excluded. When negotiations failed, the ministers preached to their congregations to boycott the firms until an agreement over hiring was reached.

Operation Breadbasket was one of the SCLC's most successful programs. When the SCLC expanded its operations to the city of Chicago, Operation Breadbasket was a key part of its program. The Rev. Jesse Jackson headed the Chicago operation.

Unfortunately the records in this series are sparse. They consist of a small Correspondence file and an Alphabetical File. There are a few field reports, reports to the executive board of the SCLC, and copies of signed agreements with employers.

#### Series VI, Dialogue Department, 1963–1966

The Dialogue Department of the SCLC was created to stimulate group discussion in southern communities across racial and ideological lines. The objective was to bring adversaries together to discuss local community problems—such as the lack of employment opportunities for African Americans, the impact of school integration, and police

brutality—in an atmosphere of understanding and mutual respect. The program was spearheaded by sociologist Harry G. Boyte with the assistance of Rachel Davis DuBois and Mew Soong Li.

Harry G. Boyte's files consist of correspondence relating to community workshops. An Alphabetical File contains material on cooperation with labor unions, on the Dialogue Program operations in Appalachia, and numerous essays by Harry Boyte. The Rachel Davis DuBois' correspondence files discuss the preparation of workshops on sensitivity training.

#### Series VII, Records of the Peace Education Project, 1966-1967

The Peace Education Project (PEP) was an outreach program designed to involve the African American community in the anti–Vietnam War movement. This small series consists of leaflets and publications of the Atlanta Alliance for Peace, files on the organization of Hiroshima Day demonstrations, and essays on the Vietnam War by PEP Director Benjamin Van Clarke. There is a significant amount of material on the Vietnam Summer movement, as well as PEP press releases, and an anti–Vietnam War article by Martin Luther King, Jr.

#### Series VIII, Records of the Poor People's Campaign, 1968

The Poor People's Campaign was designed on the model of the famous March on Washington of 1963. The campaign attempted to unite poor people of all races from every area of the United States—rural and urban—to make a pilgrimage to Washington, D.C., in order to petition government representatives for adequate programs to address the plight of the poor. The campaigners neared their destination on May 13, 1968. A tent city, called "Resurrection City," materialized on the Washington Mall. Groups of negotiators met with congressional representatives and other government officials on a daily basis for weeks.

Unfortunately, most of the records kept by the SCLC staff were destroyed when the encampment was raided by police and the inhabitants evicted. The surviving records, though not voluminous, are significant. This series consists of scattered reports, press releases, and publications. There are lists of arrested demonstrators, lists of campaign committee members and negotiators, declarations of the campaign, and letters reacting to the assassination of Martin Luther King, Jr. Field reports document the coordination of the pilgrimage at the grassroots level in numerous states, particularly in the South. Press releases and materials pertaining to the defense of jailed demonstrators are also contained in the series.
