

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SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

In the decade covered by this edition, the NAACP struggled to find an effective means to combat pervasive racial discrimination in the American workplace. The national prosperity of the 1950s and 1960s failed to include the majority of African Americans, and employment discrimination was a major reason for the failure. In attempting to provide African Americans with an entry to the economic mainstream, the NAACP exposed and confronted every aspect of employment discrimination in the modern labor force. These records extensively document that campaign.

As the NAACP files show, employment discrimination emanated from both employers and employees, including labor unions. It was common in all parts of America, and it was extremely difficult to root out in spite of local, state, and even federal antidiscrimination laws. The collection provides a wealth of information on employment discrimination in every area of the country, including discrimination in major industries and skilled trades. Airlines, performing arts, automobile making, and steel making are especially well documented.

One of the most fascinating and significant features of the edition is the documentation of the racial practices of American labor unions. The decade under focus was one of both unprecedented friction and enormously productive mutual support between the NAACP and the labor movement. The collection provides a wealth of information on this paradoxical relationship. As the earlier editions of *Papers of the NAACP, Part 13* show, the NAACP had long sought to ally itself with the American labor movement. In 1953, association leader Roy Wilkins had formed the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, which brought together an impressive array of over thirty labor, religious, and civil rights organizations to work for federal civil rights legislation. Beginning in the 1940s the NAACP encouraged its members to join labor unions (particularly the more liberal Congress of Industrial Organizations (CIO) unions), discouraged blacks from strikebreaking, and allied with organized labor in opposition to federal Taft-Hartley labor legislation. While relations with many American Federation of Labor unions were severely strained because of traditionally racist policies espoused by building trades and other craft unions, the NAACP emphasized that its criticisms of those unions did not extend to the principles of organized labor. On the other hand, organized labor, especially the CIO unions, became major

financial contributors to the NAACP by the late 1940s. Some CIO unions also encouraged NAACP membership drives within their rank and file.

In spite of this, many African Americans suffered severe discrimination in the workplace. Where blacks were unionized, generally they were concentrated in the lowest paid positions. Some unions openly refused membership to non-Caucasians. Others set up segregated auxiliary locals. Still others used more subtle but equally effective means to discriminate, including "seniority rules" and "separate lines of progression" rules, which are well documented in this edition. In the mid 1950s and early 1960s NAACP Labor Secretary Herbert Hill publicly exposed discriminatory practices in numerous unions, including the liberal International Ladies' Garment Workers Union (ILGWU) and the powerful United Steelworkers of America. Hill was a brilliant crusader who made the most of the limited legal remedies available against workplace discrimination in the 1950s and 1960s. He brought actions before the National Labor Relations Board to decertify unions that violated the nondiscrimination provisions of federal contracts. He also carried cases against both labor unions and employers to state antidiscrimination commissions. Hill consciously fashioned an employment rights campaign after the model of the legal redress campaigns that the NAACP had used in the areas of educational equality, voting rights, and housing. He drafted an *NAACP Labor Manual* that expertly described discrimination tactics in the workplace and advised African Americans what redress they might pursue. The manual was widely distributed through local NAACP branches, and it encouraged readers to bring cases of discrimination to the attention of local NAACP attorneys and Hill's NAACP Labor Department. Many of the complaints that are found throughout the files in this collection were inspired by Hill's *NAACP Labor Manual*. Arguably, his most provocative work was his hard-hitting public relations campaign against unions and employers whose discriminatory practices he meticulously uncovered.

Many labor leaders bristled at Hill's allegations. The reaction of the ILGWU was especially pained. The ILGWU had been a significant fund-raiser for the NAACP, and it was one of the most professedly liberal labor organizations in America. The ILGWU case also sheds light on the important relationship between the African American and Jewish communities. ILGWU leadership was overwhelmingly Jewish, and many of these Jews had strong ties with the civil rights movement and a proud history of involvement with the NAACP. As with the relationship between the NAACP and the labor movement, the African American–Jewish relationship is rich in paradox. This collection and several previous editions of *Papers of the NAACP* provide excellent opportunities for research on this relationship.

AFL-CIO President George Meany himself led the disclaimers on the part of the labor movement to Hill's allegations. His arguments can be found in many of the files. Black labor leader A. Philip Randolph, president of the

Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters and himself the only African American vice president of the AFL-CIO, joined in Herbert Hill's criticisms and attempted to bring the issue of racial discrimination to a head in the 1961 AFL-CIO convention. The files document Meany's angry rejection of Randolph's complaint as well. The labor movement, however, remained open to Hill through the AFL-CIO Civil Rights Department, which continued to assure the NAACP that it would do all in its power to address the racial integration of the rank and file. There are also files documenting NAACP encouragement of union organization drives, such as a 1957 Packinghouse Workers drive in Alabama. A file on the right-to-work movement documents the NAACP alliance with the labor movement in opposition.

Although the labor movement played a role in workplace discrimination, it was by no means the only source of the problem. Many companies relied upon racist personnel policies of long tradition. In some states, these practices could be contested through local fair employment practices commissions. The New York State Committee Against Discrimination (SCAD), which has a subseries in the collection, is an excellent case in point. Moreover, as the corporate headquarters of important national companies, New York was a venue through which discrimination cases could have a wide national impact. Herbert Hill used the New York SCAD to bring a measure of integration into the airline industry, for example. Many state fair employment agencies, however, were inherently weakened by weak legislation (lacking in enforcement powers or adequate funding, for example) or by the fact that they could only rule on cases that were brought before them rather than aggressively investigate discrimination in the workplace.

Frustration in dealing with the patchwork of mostly weak and inadequate state fair employment laws spurred the NAACP to press for federal civil rights legislation. One partly effective Korean War-era statute forbade discrimination by federal contractors. It was aimed particularly at defense contractors. The files in this edition are replete with Herbert Hill's complaints to the federal Office of Contract Compliance about discrimination by both corporations and labor unions. A lengthy letter to labor writer Sidney Lens in the AFL-CIO series describes a major victory that Herbert Hill secured through that office in 1956 against oil refineries in Louisiana and Arkansas. This imperfect strategy left nondefense contractors beyond the reach of federal sanctions, however. The NAACP, largely through the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, continued to press for comprehensive federal civil rights legislation and finally won in July 1964 with the Civil Rights Act. Title VII of that act brought employment discrimination, for the first time, under the realm of federal sanction. Some of the latest dated material in this edition describes how the NAACP attempted to implement the law. There are references to the campaign for the Civil Rights Act in several of the files. The bulk of the documentation on the campaign for the federal law, however, can

be found in companion editions, *Papers of the NAACP, Part 13-B, The NAACP and Labor, 1940–1955, Cooperation with Organized Labor* and *Papers of the NAACP, Part 21: NAACP Relations with the Modern Civil Rights Movement*.

Until the 1964 Civil Rights Act, southern states had no protections against racial discrimination in the workplace. NAACP actions against employment discrimination in those states was confined to direct action tactics such as boycotts and efforts to influence national corporations not to locate divisions in the South. There are many files documenting these strategies. Often they were developed in reaction to specific episodes of highly publicized civil rights clashes in the South, such as the 1963 Birmingham demonstrations and the attacks on the Selma, Alabama, marchers in 1965. Herbert Hill and the NAACP leadership watched with alarm as many national companies opened divisions in the South in search of lower labor costs during the 1950s and 1960s. They often protested to boards of directors and through publicity campaigns.

The arrangement of the files is alphabetical by subject, name of organization, and general alphabetical letters. Because many of the cases and subjects discussed in this scope and content note are scattered throughout the alphabetical letter files, it is recommended that researchers make use of the subject and name index for the most effective access to the collection.

NOTE ON SOURCES

The records microfilmed for this edition come from Group III, Series A, of the NAACP collection held by the Manuscript Division of the Library of Congress, Washington, D.C.

EDITORIAL NOTE

This edition was compiled by Professors John H. Bracey Jr. and August Meier after a complete survey of the records of the NAACP Administrative File for Group III of the original collection at the Library of Congress. The entire "Labor" series was selected. Each file has been reproduced in its entirety.
