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## SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

This edition features subject files documenting the role of the NAACP in the modern civil rights movement between 1956 and 1965. The edition contains files on leading organizations, individuals, and events of the modern civil rights era. NAACP involvement in such critical episodes as the sit-in movement, southern demonstrations, and the 1963 March on Washington is covered, as is the association's relationship with the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, the Congress of Racial Equality, the Student Non-Violent Coordination Committee, and other modern militant civil rights organizations. The continuing and ultimately successful campaign for federal civil rights legislation is detailed, as are NAACP relations with older civil rights groups such as the Southern Regional Council and with mainstrram liberal organizations such as the Anti-Defamation League of B'Nai B'rith.

In 1952 the NAACP established an umbrella organization to unite older civil rights organizations with liberal religious and labor groups in a campaign for federal civil rights legislation. This organization—the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights—is also the subject of a large file series. Many of the organizations can be found as subsets of the series called Leagues and Organizations.

The long-running battle for comprehensive federal civil rights legislation is exhaustively documented in the three separate file series titled Civil Rights, Civil Rights Act, and Civil Rights Legislation. These files detail the NAACP's role in bringing about the 1964 Civil Rights Act and 1965 Voting Rights Act. The Civil Rights series details the association's failed effort to reform U.S. Senate rules that permit filibuster obstructionism in the legislative process. The battle over the early Civil Rights Act of 1957 and the disappointment over its shortcomings are also documented. In addition, there are files on the 1956 Civil Rights Mobilization and the 1963 March on Washington. Files on individuals include William F. Buckley Jr.; congressmen Charles Diggs and Kenneth Keating; senators Paul Douglas, Clifford Case, Lyndon B. Johnson, Hubert Humphrey, and James O. Eastland; and civil rights leaders Joseph Rauh, Martin Luther King, Jr., James Meredith, Pauli Murray, Rosa Parks, and Robert Williams. Following are summaries of the major series that make up this editon.

## **Civil Rights**

There are three major subseries in the Civil Rights series: General, Rule 22, and U.S. Commission on Civil Rights. In addition to these three major subseries, there are numerous individual files. The General subseries includes complaints of violations of civil and voting rights, including lynchings. It also includes information on allegations of Communist influence in the civil rights movement, criticisms of the Eisenhower and Kennedy administrations' response to civil rights abuses, and items on events in the modern civil rights movement including rallies, demonstrations, and sit-ins (see also page xi for more information on sit-ins). The Rule 22 subseries details the NAACP's effort to reform the U.S. Senate rule that permits obstructionist filibuster speeches. Many of the NAACP's major legislative initiatives, such as antilynching and Fair Employment Practices, had been killed by minority filibusters in the 1940s and 1950s. The subseries on the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights tracks the operations of the commission that was established under the 1957 Federal Civil Rights Act to record complaints about denials of civil rights. Frustration with the commission's ineffectiveness is apparent in many of the communications.

## **Civil Rights Act**

This series meticulously details the NAACP's efforts in behalf of the successful 1964 Federal Civil Rights Act. There are commentaries on different drafts of the original bill and NAACP efforts to strengthen the bill, especially regarding employment discrimination, school desegregation policies, and federal enforcement powers. There are large correspondence files with senators and congressmen that document NAACP political influence. Files in this series dated after the Act passed in 1964 document NAACP initiatives toward compliance. Of note is the push to integrate southern branches of national retail chains.

## **Civil Rights Legislation**

This series documents the NAACP role in civil rights legislation up to and including the landmark Acts of 1964 and 1965. The NAACP replaced antilynching legislation with comprehensive civil rights legislation as its top congressional priority by 1950. The files in this series pick up in 1956 what had been an ongoing NAACP crusade. The NAACP spearheaded a coalition of pro—civil rights organizations under the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights. This group succeeded in getting Congress to enact a weak federal civil rights law in 1957. The NAACP's role is covered in this series. There are files of correspondence exhorting local branches to press their congressmen for passage and files of correspondence between the National Office and congressmen and senators. There is voluminous documentation in the "General" subseries on suggestions to strengthen the 1957 bill. Files dated

after 1957 document the NAACP's renewed push for effective federal civil rights legislation.

## **Civil Rights Mobilization**

The Civil Rights Mobilization movement also grew out of earlier crusades for federal civil rights legislation in 1950s. The Civil Rights Mobilization convened pro-civil rights organizations in Washington, D.C., in 1950 to make a display of force on behalf of the civil rights movement. The movement formed a permanent organization that in 1952 became the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights (LCCR). The files in this series document the LCCR's calling of a second Civil Rights Mobilization in 1956. Included are delegate lists and planning documents.

### Freedom Riders

This rather small series covers the Freedom Riders movement of the early 1960s. Of note are NAACP criticisms of the Congress of Racial Equality for encouraging jailed freedom riders to petition NAACP attorneys for bail money and pro bono legal assistance. The cynical "Reverse Freedom Rides" activities whereby southern officials provided penurious African Americans with one-way bus tickets to northern cities are also documented.

## **Hubert H. Humphrey and Lyndon B. Johnson**

The Humphrey and Johnson files document the support these political leaders provided for civil rights legislation in the late 1950s and early 1960s when they served in the U.S. Senate. Johnson's file documents his role in brokering a compromise that diluted the effectiveness of the 1957 Civil Rights Act. A significant part of both files documents their advocacy of civil rights during the first year of their tenure as vice president and president. Topics such as the creation of the Department of Housing and Urban Development, the formulation of federal antipoverty legislation, and concern over urban race riots are covered.

## Martin Luther King, Jr.

The file on King is extensive, encompassing three large folders of material, covering many significant episodes in King's career between 1956 and 1965. The Montgomery Bus Boycott is covered. Early NAACP financial assistance to the Montgomery Improvement Association is documented. NAACP concern over the arrest of King in Montgomery, Atlanta, Albany, and Birmingham is covered. There is a transcript of a 1960 King television appearance. Cooperation between the NAACP and King's Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) on voter registration drives is documented, as are later periods of suspicion and tension between the two organizations. Closely

related to the King files are the files on the SCLC in the Leagues and Organizations series described below.

## **Leagues and Organizations**

This series includes files on ten civil rights organizations. These include the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, the Catholic Interracial Council, the Congress of Racial Equality, the Consultative Conference on Desegregation, the Council of Federated Organizations, the Council for United Civil Rights Leadership, the Leadership Council on Civil Rights, the SCLC, the Southern Regional Council, and the Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee. The most extensive of these files is on the LCCR. Its records document the NAACP's effort to coordinate the civil rights movement toward federal civil rights legislation.

## March on Washington

This series shows the enormous extent of NAACP involvement in planning and staging the 1963 March on Washington. Planning documents reveal some dissension by NAACP officials with Bayard Rustin's leadership role in the march. There is documentation on meetings with congressmen during the march and assessments of the impact of the event in the months after. Copies of statements by numerous speakers are also included.

#### **James Meredith**

This file documents the ordeal of the first African American to gain admission to the University of Mississippi. It includes Meredith's litigation in Mississippi, harassment he experienced while attending the university, and his departure from the university.

## Pauli Murray

The file on this noted civil rights activist and feminist includes communications from Murray on constructive criticisms of the NAACP program. One memorandum complains about gender discrimination within the civil rights movement.

## **Operation Southern Story**

This series documents the NAAACP-sponsored speaking tour that visited college campuses throughout America to recount episodes of discrimination and brutality toward African Americans in the South. Numerous victims of southern harassment worked in the program, and it had a major impact in informing northern students of race relations in the South. Speakers included Daisy Bates, Rosa Parks, and Theodore Gibson.

### **Rosa Parks**

This single file documents NAACP financial assistance to Rosa Parks.

## **Prayer Pilgrimage**

The Prayer Pilgrimage was a forerunner of the March on Washington. Organized by the NAACP in cooperation with Martin Luther King Jr. of the SCLC and A. Philip Randolph of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, the pilgrimage assembled thousands of demonstrators in Washington in 1957 on the third anniversary of the *Brown v. Board of Education* decision. The intent was to make a physical demonstration in favor of federal civil rights legislation and to protest federal inaction in the face of white backlash in the South. The event was an important episode of cooperation between King and the NAACP, and it provided King with an early opportunity to be seen at the pinnacle of the civil rights movement.

#### Sit-ins

This extensive series documents the NAACP's support of the sit-in movement throughout the country from the earliest episodes. The files show that the NAACP mobilized its branches and local Youth Councils to augment the ranks of the sit-in demonstrators. Many of the targets of the sit-ins were southern chain stores and lunch counters. The sit-ins in Atlanta, Tallahassie, and Jacksonville are especially well covered, though dozens of other cases are documented. Cooperation and friction between the NAACP and newer organizations like the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee are well documented.

### **Robert Williams**

This file concerns a local NAACP leader from Monroe, North Carolina, who in 1959 openly advocated retaliatory violence as a strategy for the civil rights movement. The NAACP leadership ardently defended its strategy of nonviolent political and legal redress and suspended Williams from his local leadership position. The suspension provoked an extensive write-in campaign regarding the legitimacy of violence in the civil rights movement.
